University City cleans-up it's act!




Volunteers from the community join Mayor Sanders and Scott Peters in cleaning up our neighborhood.

UC kids win in Robotics, beating 97 other countries around the world

Two University City-based teams of high school and middle school students won top awards at a robotics world championship held in April Atlanta, Georgia. The winning students were recently honored for their accomplishments by both Mayor Sanders and Congresswoman Susan Davis. The team members will also demonstrate – and give the public a chance to drive – the award-winning robots at the UC Celebration on July 4 at Standley Park.

Team E.M.P., consisting of Jeb Brooks, Mark Escobedo, and RJ Sheperd of University City, along with Julien Long, Justin Ripley, and Ian Schroeder, claimed top honors at the World Championship. All the members of Team E.M.P. are high schoolers at High Tech High International and High Tech High. Einstein's Daughters – one of the few all-girls teams competing in the league - was awarded the Innovate Award for the most innovative design solution to this year's robotic challenge. The judges reported that the girls achieved a solution they had not seen attempted by any other team at the World Championship or at any of the many regional tournaments. The members of Einstein's Daughters are Katy Anderson. Katie Brooks, Laura Decorte, Katie Ho, Mia Sheperd, and Maddie Taylor - all of University City and all students at the High Tech Village schools

In the competition, teams were required to design, build and program a robot to score points by collecting and scoring softballs scattered over the playing field, along with certain other tasks. The robots faced off in two-ontwo competitions, so strategy and good defense were as important as scoring lots of balls. The design and programming of the robots was totally up to the student participants.



Beautifying the Park and Ride at the end of Governor




The Mayor, Scott Peters and the members of the UCCA Board help clean up and beautify the Park and Ride.

Will Proposed City Budget Cuts effect UC?

University City and our community swimming pool are likely to suffer from our Mayor's proposed budget cuts. One third of the city of San Diego's aquatics staff will be laid off under this budget proposal. While the Mayor pledges that services will not suffer, the numbers do not add up to our benefit. "I don't think more people equal better service," he tells the various community

groups he has been touring since he released his 2008 budget last month. But, reduced staff will result is lower availability of personnel to perform the services needed by the communities to whom the Mayor has made his pledge for continued service levels. The Mayor concedes that it will take a year for the City to determine how best to use the personnel resources available, once the cuts are made.

One idea that has been put forth by the Mayor is that results will be measured by the "outcome" of services performed and not by the quantity of "output". It appears to be a noble idea but not a very pragmatic one. In the meanwhile, UC will have to adopt a "wait and see" attitude about the whole plan. All the while, our swimming pool remains a "hole in the ground", albeit filled with water, between September and May.
