Standley Park Staff Members Serve the U.C. Community

When you Baby Boomers start counting the days until retirement, try to picture Earl Jaeggi's career choices. Could you keep up with Earl, who has served as a member of the grounds maintenance team at Standley Park since 1977, three years after the opening of our popular park? Earl spent 31 productive years in the Navy, followed by six years as a pier guard at Ocean Beach. Then he moved to Standley Park as an employee and anticipated working another ten years. Earl is in his 27th year here at Standley, and he'll blow out 85 candles on his September 14th birthday cake this year. Is he ready to quit? Never.

He likes his job, is good at it, and enjoys the 6:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. schedule, including the commute from La Mesa to University City. In the summer months he plays golf after work. Earl remembers when the park and recreation were two different departments in the City. Initially he was responsible for only one ball field and the inside of Standley Recreation Center. The park department did the outside labor until the two groups merged into park and recreation

department. Now he's responsible for every field and outside area of Standley Park. He recalls how Proposition 13 cut into the free programs available and how busy the park has always been. Earl feels lucky that there is very little vandalism here, although it comes in spurts. His responsibilities also include taking care of Marcy, Spreckels, and Standley, along with coworkers Rocky Ramirez and Al Williams. Doyle Park takes care of McElroy Field and U.C. Village Park.

"I'm glad people use the park so much," he says. When asked if he encountered any rattlesnakes in his job, he said that he's only seen one. However, for a while there was a blue fox living in the canyon. At Marcy he witnessed peacocks strutting around and a Shetland pony that lived nearby. Earl credits the Eagle Scouts for building steps and a canyon trail behind Standley. Right now it would be great for Eagle Scout candidates to help this same trail that is in disrepair. Earl's seen a lot of changes in U.C. and Standley. He's seen a lot of park and recreation directors pass through the

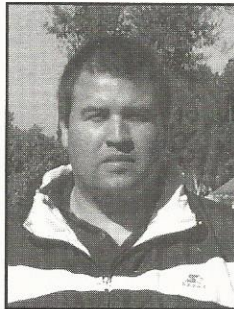
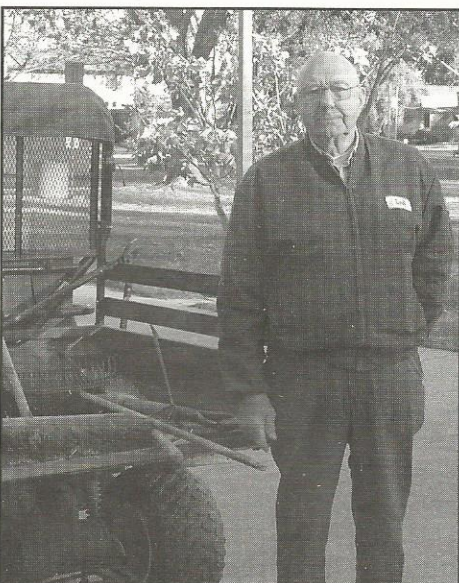
front door of the center, and he's a good role model for all of them.

Our newest center director, David Benedict, has been with the park and rec director since 1994. He's happy to be back at Standley Park, where he once served as rec leader, co-camp director and special events coordinator. He brings an educational background with a degree in business management and recreation administration from San Diego State and he's a Mira Mesa resident with his wife and three children, ages 3, 6, and 7 1/2. One of his goals is to revitalize the recreation center building. He's been straightening out the

inventory, and giving the building a good cleaning. David is getting volunteers together to paint the building. "I want to bring the special events back to their heyday." He'd like to reinstate the City Dance classes with jazz and tap at a low cost to residents too.

With the City hiring freeze, Standley hours are Monday through Thursday: 12 p.m. to 9 p.m.; Friday the hours are 12 p.m. to 7 p.m., and Saturday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. The facility is closed on Sundays. David appreciates "the strong community" of University City and the parent interactions. He sees the residents as "second eyes" ready to report to the rec center. Whether it's a homeless issue or vandalism, it's not as big an issue here as in some other areas of the city. He encourages locals to write down license plates of cars parked late at night near the recreation center and call Standley at 552-1652. It's been especially fun for David to see the change in kids after his seven-year absence away from Standley Park.

U.C. is delighted to have both Earl and David dedicated to our families who use Standley for recreation and relaxation.

UC Beautification Update

In recent weeks, some in the community have inquired about the status of the UC Beautification Project. I wanted to let you know that my staff and I have been working on moving the project forward through the City's process so that we can start to assemble the funding and begin construction within the next couple of years.

As most know, this is a two-phase project. The first phase was completed with the planting of 57 trees along Governor Drive. The second phase, now known as "Splash Walk," will consist of a meandering, colorfully-landscaped path along the south side of Governor, primarily in front of Standley Park. The path would consist of colorful pop-outs with places for pedestrians to relax and enjoy their surroundings. The plan would also replace the existing asphalt median with stamped concrete. We arrived at this concept after

several meetings with the UCCA and many of your neighbors.

We are now working with City staff to obtain a detailed estimate on how much the project will cost. The next step will be to bid the project, and then once a contractor has been selected, get the project into design. Funding remains our biggest challenge, in light of the current budget situations at the Federal, State and local levels. We are now working on funding the design process. Our hope is that once the design is complete, we will be able to compete for available funding.

Once complete, this project will greatly improve the aesthetics along Governor Drive. We plan to keep the community updated as we move through this process. Please feel free to contact my office (619) 236-6611 if you would like to learn more about the project.

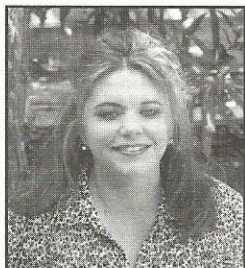

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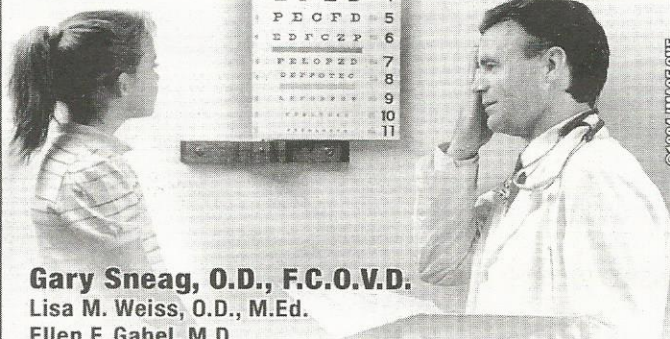


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
