Governor Medians Will Get a Makeover in 2012 By Sandy Lippe

he City of San Diego's budget woes have even impacted the medians on Governor Drive because there is no money to maintain them. Diseased and dying plants need to be removed and replaced. The UCCA Beautification team has been working with the

City on an encroachment agreement that will give UCCA responsibility for these medians. (Your UCCA membership fees will help pay for this project, so please join UCCA.) UCCA vice president Barry Bernstein has signed off on the encroachment agreement, and UCCA has a design for

replacing dead and diseased plants

on the medians on Governor at Stresemann, Radcliffe, and Agee. Trista Silvia, a parent and co-chair of

the Spreckels' Garden Club, is acting as a landscape architect consultant. She presented a design to the UCCA board that involves native plants that are drought tolerant and give a sense of seasonal movement. Every month something is happening. UCCA is in the process of hiring a gardener to maintain the medians once the plants go in. Trista is looking for willing volunteers interested in the beautification project to help remove some of the diseased and dying plants. The Beautification team will also be seeking bids from wholesale nurseries. If you have any contacts, please share them with us. This project is a community one.

Continuing the fight to cut taxes and create jobs.

s Chairman of the Assembly Select Committee on Job Creation for the New Economy, I take my responsibility seriously to make California a competitive place so we can create good-paying jobs. We must reduce the regulatory burden, ease the tax burden and put policies in place to make California more competitive with other states.



Last week, we put forward a proposal that would do two of the three. I worked with Governor Jerry Brown and colleagues from both sides of the aisle to embrace a tax reform measure put in place by Governors like Rick Perry in Texas, Chris Christie in New Jersey and Mitch Daniels in Indiana.

Our efforts would have resulted in important tax reform and simultaneously provided a billion dollars in permanent, annual tax relief for small business, manufacturers, and working families. The measure passed out of the Assembly with support from both sides of the aisle, but came up a bit short in the Senate. The fight isn't over, and I am working with legislative leaders and the Governor to pass this important tax reform plan in the next legislative session. We need to take decisive action to help get our state back on track.

We took on some powerful interests, and fought for a group of people with no lobby-individual citizens and small business owners who are struggling. But it was the right thing to do, and you never go wrong when following what you believe is the right decision. Last week we proved again it is possible to bring a coalition together and begin to drive real change. However, real change is never easy. I will keep you posted as we continue to fight for this important reform.

Ever curious to find out when your street might get a much-needed facelift? From Sherri Lightner's Office

The City of San Diego is adding a new feature to its website (www.sandiego.gov) that will give an update on which streets are getting ready to be repayed.

The updates are part of a larger \$47 million project designed to repave more than 100 miles of San Diego streets. As of August, the some 53 miles of city streets had been repaved. By the end of the project, which is being paid for with deferred-maintenance bond money, more than a 1,000 city blocks will be repaved.

The historic repaving project, which began in April 2010, is on schedule to resurface almost as many miles of streets as had been done in the previous eight fiscal years combined. In September, the following streets were slated to be repaved:

La Jolla Village Drive from Villa La Jolla to Genesee Avenue. Nobel Drive from the northbound I-5 on-ramp to Genesee Avenue.

Genesee Avenue from Campus Point Drive to Fez Street.

I know there is much more to do and that the quality of our roads is an important issue to all University City residents. Condo Owners Lauded For Halting Retirement Party

resident or residents of the condominium complex on the west side of Genesee Avenue are to be congratulated for breaking up a potentially raucous party on Tamilynn Street, an area of private homes just east of Genessee. The party was nipped in the bud at 6:30 Saturday evening after the band had been playing mature adult music for about one hour.

Celebrating her 33 years of employment at the International Center/Warren College at UCSD was a longtime UC resident also of 33 years (name withheld for personal protection!) the owner of the home where the party was held.

Police arrived to find a large gathering of adults most of whom were consuming alcoholic beverages, enjoying the music, and dining on catered food from a well-known San Diego restaurant. Police did not note any underage drinking or drug activity and observed that the average age of attendees was approximately 55. Among those present were her daughter, a physician in Idaho, two local San Diego judges, an internationally known astrophysicist and retired Physics Professor, a local business owner and a civil attorney.

The resident was told by police that in order to have a live music performance of that nature required a permit from the City of San Diego. It was concluded that the mere possession of such a permit attenuates objectionable sounds in such a way that they cannot be heard outside the immediate perimeter of a residence.

The hostess was released by police, without posting bail, on her own recognizance and neither the band leader, (a University City resident and retired school teacher), nor the employees of the restaurant were cited.

The party, which was in the planning stages for months, immediately subsided with many guests leaving early in disappointment of what planned to be a wonderful evening.

These residents were not able to enjoy happy sounds in place of the constant sirens on Genesee Ave.

This reporter would like to add that because of diligent observations and subsequent action from our crime fighting police, the city of San Diego is a much more enjoyable and safe community.

- Use a steering wheel locking device.
- Do not leave ANYTHING in view in your vehicle.

- Write down the serial numbers of your property.
- Report suspicious activity. Most law enforcement arrests start as a call from a concerned citizen.

School Board Committed to Community Collaboration

he Board of Education has made a commitment to a "quality school in every neighborhood." What does this mean for UC?

It means greater connection between the local community and the school. The school is not merely "located" in a neighborhood. It should be part of the neighborhood. Everyone needs to see the schools as vital to the community, not only for parents who currently have kids in school. We can use volunteers of all ages in the schools. The upgrade of the UC High stadium with Friday night lights will be the pride of the community when the 2012 football season opens.

It means encouraging the local teachers and principals to work together as a team from K-12 to find the best solutions for UC schools. This is a change from having everything mandated by the district. Even in extremely difficult budget times, it means allowing schools and communities to set priorities with their limited dollars.

It means having an active UC Cluster Committee (for all five UC schools), which serves as an advisory council to the Board of Education, much as UCPG advises City Council on local issues. We are also fortunate to have a seasoned foundation (EdUCate!) supporting UC schools.

As transportation cutbacks are made, it means encouraging more students to attend the school in their own neighborhood. Many people do not realize the high achievement of our UC schools. Once the word gets out more neighborhood kids will be attending their local school.

It means seeing school facilities as assets of the local community. I recall many years ago when trailers were unceremoniously dropped on the front lawn of Standley Middle School by the district without consulting the community. The district is now committed to community consultation on a wide variety of issues.

It was only after talking to others that I began to hypothesize as to why so many people had a similar story and felt the same way and I wanted to share my thoughts about it.
