The History of Our Newsletter

From humble beginnings in 2002, the UCCA newsletter has become a part of the University City community. When the University City Community Association (UCCA) was revived in March 2002, the officers agreed our community needed a newsletter. At the April meeting, residents in attendance responded to a call for volunteers to help deliver the first issue throughout UC in May. The "can do" spirit of UC residents launched the first edition—a simple two-sided page filled with information about the budding association, the first street banners, community clean up, free street trees and a newly launched website and Garden Club. A membership application was attached. Long time resident, Tom Ventimiglia, placed the first ad. His generous contribution helped defray the cost of duplication. Sixteen volunteers walked multiple streets in UC and became the nucleus of the neighbor to neighbor distribution system.

Our second edition, in June, grew to four pages, thanks to an anonymous donor who offset paper costs by supplying enough paper stock to print a four page edition through the end of the year. The printer helped us by storing the paper. Four ads helped to defray printing costs. The number of our volunteers grew, and we were on our way to publishing ten editions of the newsletter each year.

By the first anniversary of the newsletter in May 2003, our delivery team had grown from 16 to over 100 volunteers. In those early days, we didn't have websites where we could easily count the number of homes on a block. Our faithful volunteers counted the number of homes on a street as they walked their route and helped establish accurate counts throughout the community. Eight volunteers served as area coordinators for delivery volunteers; they, along with other volunteers, faithfully sorted the newsletters into bundles for delivery routes each edition. Ad revenue offset part of the printing costs, with membership dues covering the rest.

Fast forward to 2012, and the newsletter continues as a bigger, better publication thanks to the "can do" spirit of everyone involved. Through the combined efforts and support of many individuals and businesses, the newsletter has been self sustaining the past few years with ad revenue paying for publication and the editor.

As we look forward to future editions, we give special thanks to all our past and present volunteers for making the newsletter possible, and to the staff at Master Print Communications for their continued support as we transition to a new editor and delivery coordinator.

Credit Union ATM at Sprouts Parking Lot By Bonnie Hornbeck

The California Coast Credit Union ATM located in the parking lot at the Sprouts shopping center at Governor Dr. and Regents Rd. is scheduled to be removed at the end of Jan. 2012. This ATM is heavily used by University City residents, especially our elderly population, because it doesn't charge fees and is conveniently located. With the removal of this ATM, the nearest no-charge ATMs would be in Clairemont Square, at UCSD, or at the North UC Vons off Regents Rd. Any of those locations involve driving in significant traffic to access them.

I called the credit union and also Kam Walton at Cushman & Wakefield (the shopping center representatives for the owners) to find out why the ATM was being removed. Kam expressed a willingness to take renegotiation to the shopping center owners. Rob Miller, a Sr. VP of the Credit Union, helpfully informed me that (a) the ATM was very old and needed replacement and (b) the American Disabilities Act required them to make expensive physical changes to meet new ADA requirements. The credit union was willing to pay the modest increase in rental rates, but the shopping center owners were unwilling to share the cost of the ATM upgrades. Since talks between the credit union and Cushman & Wakefield about cost sharing to bring the ATM kiosk up to ADA codes fell through, the credit union felt it had no choice except to remove the ATM.

I worked with UCCA's Sandy Lippe and Shelley Plumb to place flyers at the ATM regarding whom to call. The flyers resulted in UC residents calling Rob Miller at the Credit Union as well as Cushman & Wakefield representatives. UCCA supported our efforts on behalf of the community. The Credit Union (Rob Miller) told me that they are back in discussions with Cushman & Wakefield. There seems to be some positive movement toward keeping the ATM where it is. The deadline for the newsletter came before I had received the final decision.

Excellence in University City Schools By John Lee Evans



University City schools have a lot to be thankful for as we begin 2012. We have a strong and dedicated staff at all of our five neighborhood schools. On a district level we received a national award from the Kennedy Center for outstanding music education. A contingent of UC orchestra students performed at the December 13 meeting of the

Board of Education. San Diego Unified is also a national leader in technology with our acclaimed i-21 program that is putting a laptop in the hands of every student in the district.

San Diego Unified is placing an emphasis on a district level for a broad curriculum that goes beyond our high test scores and includes an emphasis on music and the arts, physical fitness, character education and critical thinking.

We are all aware of the economic crisis affecting our community, our state and our nation. Since I came on the board three years ago we have cut hundreds of millions from the budget and have reduced our teaching and support staff. We are now doing the same job with about 2,000 fewer employees. Nevertheless, the teachers and staff continue to work hard. National test results released before winter break showed that we are doing an outstanding job in improving student achievement in comparison with other districts across the country.

As President of the San Diego Unified Board, I will do everything within my power to continue the fine work of our schools. We can only divide up the money that the state decides to give us. We will take whatever measures necessary to make sure we balance our budget to protect our local control of the schools. We will not do anything that would allow the state or county to intervene. This will require shared sacrifice on the part of our employees, students, parents and community. I have noticed a sincere desire on the part of our unions to cooperate in this crisis. We have already made many tough choices. Now the Governor and the legislature need to make the tough choices to ensure that our schools have the funds we need to operate.

San Diego schools are worth investing in and we have the results to prove it.




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

MORE than a Tree Lighting

On Friday, December 9th the University City Community Association sponsored the 10th annual Tree Lighting at Standley Park and Recreation Center.
