1-Mile Fun Run/5K Race: Participants can register online at uccelebration.com until July 3, then in-person day of starting at 6:30am. 1-Mile Fun Run starts at 7:45am, and the 5K at 8:00am. Cost is \$25.

Beer & Wine Garden: Open 12:00 to 7:00pm at the Gazebo. Must be 21 and older to enter.

Bike and Pet Parade: Starts at 10:30am, led by the Mission Bay Montessori Band. Line up in Standley Middle School parking lot. Decorate your bikes and dress up your dogs.

Book Barn: Opens at 9:00am. Book donations can be dropped off at First Baptist Church, 5055 Governor Drive - look for the red bin and sign next to the front door of the main building. All books welcome, but especially children's, young adult, and travel books.

Vacation Planning Protect Your Home While Away

This being a prime time for vacations, one must still engage in protecting ones property while away. There is more to this than just packing up and locking the door. The criminals can have a field day during this time, unless you are pro-active in hardening the target, your home.

VACATION TIPS

- 1. Don't give your name, phone number or whereabouts on your answering machine message. Never say you aren't home. Just ask the caller to leave a message. Avoid sending messages via computer or Facebook with any details, no dates.
- 2. Don't leave your garage door opener where it is easily accessible if you have to leave your car outside; take it in the house with your keys. Keep your vehicle registration, proof of insurance and any other papers with your home address on them where a criminal won't find them. Keep keys away from windows and front doors.
- 3. Don't give cleaning people, babysitters or others working in your home access to your home keys or alarm codes.
- 4. Have a neighbor pick up papers, fliers or any items delivered. Do not order items that may come while you are away.
- 5. Be sure a neighbor knows how to turn off your main water and gas valves.
- 6. Fill out the form for an RSVP check while away. It is a free service with our SDPD. Go to the SDPD website, click on services, scroll down to "vacation house check" click on the form, fill it out and send in to Northern Division. The RSVP officers will come by to check every day. They will contact you if necessary.
- 7. Be sure locks or dowel rods on doors and windows are in place including side gates. Set timers for lights to come on inside and out. Check that no one can see inside your home.
- 8. Leave a key with a trusted neighbor.

If Someone in an Official Position Tells you to Buy Gold, It's a Scam

Now that buying gold bars has come back into popularity with retailers such as Costco making the purchase easy, those of us in law enforcement see a disturbing trend in which scammers, who are pretending to be government officials, bank reps or computer technology support experts, are telling victims to buy gold, silver, or other precious metals to protect their funds.

The financially devastating scam, as with many similar schemes, begins with a computer pop-up window telling the user that their computer has been hacked or that a virus has been detected on their device. There are many iterations of how this scam plays out, such as bad actors saying they are from the Social Security Administration, a banking institution or a tech support employee. The outcome, however, does not vary. It ends with a victim, typically a senior citizen, being defrauded of their financial wealth and dignity. The most common method is when a scammer fools a victim into thinking their computer has a virus or has been hacked and that the victim needs to allow "Microsoft" or some other company remote access the victim's computer to protect them.

Our San Diego Elder Justice Task Force, made up of local and federal law enforcement partners, works collaboratively to hold these perpetrators accountable in state and federal prosecutions. One recent case involved a Carlsbad victim who reported to police that she was involved in a monthslong scam by fraudsters posing as government, bank and techsupport employees. Eventually, when the bad actors realized how much the victim had in savings, they convinced her she could safeguard her funds by obtaining gold bars and sending them to the U.S. Treasury, which would create a locker under her name. Over the course of two months, the victim sent more than \$1 million via wire transfers to a precious metal business located in San Marcos. She was told to give the precious metal, which was mostly gold, to an individual under the false pretense that it was being secured for safekeeping. She was actually giving her life savings to a criminal network.

Government officials and legitimate businesses will never request you purchase gold or other precious metals. These tips could help prevent a scam from happening:

- Never allow anyone to install remote access software on your computer or to download apps on your phone.
- Never disclose your home address or agree to meet with unknown individuals to deliver cash or precious metals.
- Do not click on unsolicited pop-ups on your computer, links sent via text messages, or email links and attachments.
- Do not contact unknown telephone numbers provided in pop-ups, texts, or emails.
- Do not allow unknown individuals access to your computer.
- If anyone asks you to pay for something or to secure your money by wiring money, using crypto currency, Bitcoin, gift cards or to pay large sums of cash or buy gold, end contact with that person immediately. You are being scammed.
- Immediately talk to someone you trust.
- Never believe anyone who tells you that you will get into trouble if you tell someone else about a situation that involves your money or financial accounts.

If you suspect that you have been the victim of fraud, report it or any suspicious activities to the FBI IC3 at www.ic3.gov and to your local police agency. If you have been the victim of elder abuse, report it to Adult Protective Services: 800.339-4661.

California Unveils Digital Democracy

District 6 Councilmember Kent Lee

Hello University City Neighbors,

On June 11th, following several months of deliberations and hearings, the San Diego City Council unanimously approved the Mayor's proposed budget. Key changes we made to the final budget focused on protecting proven programs—reversing cuts and increasing funding for vital housing, homelessness, pothole repairs, and community programs. Serving UC in particular, the final budget included \$150,000 towards long-awaited streetlights in Vista La Jolla as well as numerous programmatic restorations such as continued funding for critical year-round pool programs at Standley Aquatic Center, library programs, and more.

Even though it's a difficult budget year, our neighborhoods deserve these services and investments, and as Chair of the Budget Committee, I was honored to work with my colleagues to deliver a final budget that reflected the community's priorities. While serving as Chair of the budget review process, we also worked this year to make public input easier, and these modifications reflect the feedback you gave us. These additions are on top of many positive recommendations from Mayor Gloria, including major investments in road repair, infrastructure, public safety, and homelessness. I look forward to seeing this budget in action in the 2024-25 fiscal year.

Last month, the University Community Plan Update continued to move forward as well — unanimously recommended by the Land Use and Housing Committee to the full City Council for consideration. Even as we work to fulfill the City's housing, jobs, as well as climate goals, our office continues to believe in the need for community infrastructure, parks and open space, and intentional affordable housing as part of our long-term planning. In particular, we continue to also seek to address concerns regarding potential changes to Governor Dr. — both recognizing the needs for traffic-calming and safety as well as the need to mitigate any additional gridlock.

Last month we also celebrated the expansion of the North County Transit District's (NCTD) Sorrento Valley COASTER Connection. NCTD has stepped up in a big way, continuing and expanding routes from the COASTER to improve connectivity to major employment hubs serving University City, Torrey Pines, Sorrento Mesa, and UC San Diego — including many of San Diego's largest employers in the life sciences and technology industries. I'm proud to serve on NCTD's board representing the City of San Diego and thank NCTD's dedicated staff as well as the support of my fellow board members from across the greater region for making this project possible. From Candidate to Changemaker: H. Puentes' Mission to Diversify STEM in San Diego

In 2020, H. Puentes launched an ambitious bid for the Council seat of San Diego's District 1, covering the vibrant northwest, including University City. Though his campaign didn't end in victory, the question lingered: where has this determined candidate's path led him since then?

At that time, H. (a moniker provided by his mother) crossed paths with San Diego biotech pioneer Bill Rastetter, sparking conversations about their shared frustration — the lack of diversity among people of color in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) companies in San Diego and across the country.

"For years, Bill and I heard executives and board members talk about the need to increase representation, but nothing was changing," said H., 40. "Eventually, we realized we needed to address the root of the problem by reaching back into the education system. Our goal became to create a predictable talent pipeline from underserved communities into STEM-driven companies in San Diego."

In 2020, H. and Bill founded San Diego Squared (sd2.org/) with the long-term mission to increase representation at STEM-driven companies in San Diego through key partnerships, long-term mentorship, and financial support for underrepresented high school and college students and their educators.

"We have three areas of focus: Fellows, Scholars, and Internships," H. said. "Our SD2 Fellows program supports 118 diverse high school students. The Scholarship program has awarded over \$1.5 million in scholarships to 42 graduating high school students pursuing degrees in STEM-related fields. The Internship program has placed 70 diverse college students in internships with local STEM companies."

Long-term, H. and Bill aim to expand San Diego Squared's model to other cities in California and eventually across the country.

"Talent lives in all communities, driving innovation, fostering social harmony, and giving us a competitive edge with smart, highly motivated employees," H. said. When it comes to celebrating diversity, H. leads by example. Born to immigrants from Colombia, he, and his wife Róisín, a pharmacist from Ireland, are raising two young, multicultural children, Emily, 4 and Owen, 3. "We love University City; this is our home," he added.

UC Planning Group Meeting Update

The UCPG meeting for June 11 had some simple action items and a large information item scheduled. The UCPG voted unanimously to approve an amendment to its newly adopted Terms and Conditions that permits board members to attend meetings and vote remotely without excuse or notice. The UCPG still encourages members of the board and public to attend meetings in person when possible.

The UCPG will have a booth at the UC Celebration on July 4 at Standley Park. Stop by and say hello!

The UCPG heard an update about the Los Penasquitos Lagoon project. The city will begin work on this project in 2025 to restore the sensitive and unique habitat of the Lagoon. A feature of the project is a five-year Phase 1 restoration followed by a five-year study to measure the effectiveness of Phase 1, to be repeated in subsequent phases of the project. A near term benefit will be the substantial reduction of flooding in some Sorrento Valley commercial areas during "10-year floods".

The City Council Land Use & Housing subcommittee, chaired by D6 CM Kent Lee and Vice Chaired by D1 CM Joe LaCava, met on June 13 to consider Blueprint SD, the University Community Plan, and the Hillcrest Focused Plan amendment, and their associated draft Environmental Impact Reports. We were encouraged that Council Members Lee and LaCava shared our concerns with affordable housing, preservation of groceries, and the need for up to date and school sensitive traffic analysis on the proposed Governor Drive lane reductions. CM Lee moved and CM LaCava seconded the recommendation to approve staff's draft community plan with the addition of a Governor Drive traffic study taking school drop-off and pick-up times into account.

Andy Wiese, UCPG Plan Update Subcommittee Chair, presented to LU&H regarding four key areas of the draft Plan:

Land Use Intensity.

The UCPG has consistently argued for a land use scenario with a maximum density of 145 Dwelling Units / Acre (145 DU/AC). This Community Scenario provides room for 22,500 new dwelling units and 55,000 jobs. Our concern is not with density per se but the form, design, and location it will take. Mesa Nueva on the east UC San Diego campus is an example of 8-10 story housing with studios to three-bedroom units and an attractive street life. We asked that LU&H recommend considering the Community Scenario in the Draft EIR so it could be a possible choice by City Council.

2. Parks Deficit.

The plan has a Parks Master Plan point deficit of 4,000 points at buildout, so approval of this plan does not serve the needs of an additional 40,000 people. We are equally concerned with the proposed deficit in Rec Centers and Aquatic Centers. We see these problems as a red flag, showing that the plan is overbuilt. We asked that LU&H recommend addressing these deficits in the final UC Plan and suggested in our report specific recommendations on how to achieve this goal.

3. Zoning and Displacement

A third key concern in the Plan is the potential for displacement of both residential housing and community serving retail, particularly in the retail centers adjacent to the Nobel Drive Trolley station. These are the principal community shopping areas in north UC, and the only shopping plazas and accessible grocery stores on the Blue Line north of downtown. The UCPG recommends that a Community Village / Community

Commercial (CC-3-9) zoning replace the Plan's proposed zoning of EMX-2 that does not require housing and unnecessarily pits high tech and bio tech development against community serving retail and housing, a natural for this area.

4. Urban Public Spaces.

Specifically, we asked LU&H to hold firm on the 5% Urban Public Spaces requirement for new development over a given size. No requirement in the proposed regulations requires existing developments to provide these spaces, but this is a modest proposal to require new development to provide publicly accessible park amenities in exchange for significant increases in development intensity. City Planning estimates that as many of 3,400 points will come from Urban Public Space requirements for residential development, and the draft Plan includes these points in our park points total. The UCPG supports these regulations and recommends they be strengthened and expanded. The City Council will consider the University Community Plan on July 30, 2024.



Governor Drive CIP Improvements Underway

A City of San Diego Capital Improvements Program (CIP) project is underway to improve the water and sewer infrastructure in the University City area. The University City Improv. 1 project will replace approximately 10,170 linear feet (1.93 miles of existing water mains and install approximately 8,896 linear feet (1.68 miles) of new sewer mains.

Preparation for work has begun on some residential streets west of Genesee. This project will be conducted in phases. An initial round of notifications has been distributed to residents along impacted streets to-date. Affected streets include: Governor Drive west of Genesee, Honors Drive, Pennant Way, Bragg Street, Curie Place, Stadium Street, Syracuse Avenue, and adjacent streets. When Fireproofing Your House, Don't Forget the Vents

Houses, especially houses built before 2007, have soffit vents which allow air in to clear out water vapor that can build up in attic spaces. This reduces the risk of mold. Unfortunately, the standard back then was to use a quarter inch galvanized screen to keep birds out. It keeps birds out but lets termites, bees and fire embers in. Embers can enter during a conflagration or neighbor's house fire. The city is recommending a one sixteenth of an inch stainless steel screening. This will only allow embers that are 64 times smaller than the quarter inch screen, it also has the added benefit of stopping bees and termites as well.

Most homes also have air exit vents which should also be covered with the one sixteenth inch stainless steel screening. Other things we can do to improve the survivability of our home: remove all combustible ground cover within 5 feet of your home, replace flammable wood siding or engineered wood panel siding (Masonite) with noncombustible materials and cover fascia's and other exposed combustible non-combustible elements with materials as much as possible. There are also fire and ember resistant vents



which require removing the existing vent assembly.

We are starting to see insurance companies and governing authorities taking the fireproofing of houses much more seriously. In University City, a house sale recently fell through because the buyer could not acquire fire insurance. Further the state is moving to allow catastrophe modeling for communities which does not bode well for south UC, where only one of the three planned roads have been completed. 


