SUMMARY OF UCCA GENERAL MEETING July 10, 2024 at University Community Library

Excerpts of Minutes taken by
 Katie Rodolico, UCCA Secretary

President's remarks: Thanks to all who participated in the 4th of July UC Celebration, including many UCCA board members. The UCCA board approved UC Celebration sponsorship of \$1,000.

Public Safety

Office Anderson Brown: The Call Center is almost fully staffed, meaning shorter wait times. Calls for service are slightly down year over year. Top calls are: larceny, car theft, vandalism, simple assaults. All of the crime numbers are down from last year. He encourages the community to use Get It Done for non-emergency reports and requests. The city is implementing more street cameras, which help find stolen vehicles and crime investigations. Last month, there were 10 arrests, 7 accidents, 1 hit & run, and 0 DUI.

Public Project Reports

Pure Water – Mariah Almasco and Clem Wassenberg: Active work on three tunnels: at SR 52, Rose Canyon, and I-805. Work has been completed on Nobel between Town Center and Via Las Ramblas. Next phase on Nobel will be from Via Las Ramblas to Lombard. Also active work on tunneling operation under Rose Creek and the Amtrak tracks. At San Clemente, the tunnel is completed under the freeway ramp and San Clemente Creek. Parking lot restoration will occur after contractors are done.

UC Improvement Project: Water mains and sewer mains are being replaced on some streets west of Genesee. Projects start at the bottom and move up the hill. Streets will be closed for through traffic, but open for residents, who will be notified. Contact reema@tworiverspr.com for questions.

City of SD Trash Services Study – Paula Roberts, Aqua Community Relations Group: In 2022, voters approved Measure B, amending the People's ordinance. The City is restricted to charge no more than actual collection costs, but can charge less. After the City conducts their survey, a plan will be introduced, initiating a 45-day period of "protests." Meetings will be rolled out, including Open Houses, next one is September 9 at the La Jolla Library. Single-family homes and complexes with 4 units or less will be covered in this new city fee, complexes with more than 4 units will have to provide their own trash service.

Elected Official Representatives

Zach Burton for Councilmember Kent Lee: Thanks to Parks & Rec and Nobel Library for the movie in the park; thanks for UC Celebration. Budget highlights include expedited pot hole repairs, new street lights funded, year-round aquatic activities.

Codi Viera for Congressman Scott Peters: Introduced bipartisan bill 'Fix our Forests', which encourages active forest protection. A Congressional App Competition is in place, with a "Hackathon" this fall. Service academy nominations are due in October.

Evan Bridgham for SD Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer: In a new fiscal year, with new grant funding. More funding is allocated for the Shallow Rent program which helps seniors who are close to eviction stay housed, giving \$500/month and case work to at-risk seniors.

Marc Schaefer from State Senator Brian Jones: UCCA was selected as an Honored Non-Profit of the Year. Working on legislation for clearing homeless encampments after the Grants Pass Supreme Court decision; and on a bill to place sexually violent predators so they are not close to schools. Will be offering a CHP class – Age Well Drive Smart program.

Community Groups

Chris Nielsen, UCPG: A CIP (Community Improvement Projects) list was generated and approved by UCPG, which included: Genesee/Governor Bike Boxes and leading interval pedestrian signs; cooling at Standley Rec Center, three overlook parks identified in the Plan Update, UC Gardens landscaping and/or more parking, and expansion of University Community Library (funds to study renovation project).

Get It Done



Use the Get-It-Done app to request Homeless Outreach services and report Encampments

San Diego's Get-It-Done website and smartphone app have a feature that allow users to request Homeless Outreach services and report Encampments. Whether the user makes a service request for Homeless Outreach or reports an Encampment, Get-It-Done also records the location and any submitted pictures to create a map with a location and an image of the problem.

The report is forwarded to Homeless Outreach Specialists, the Environmental Services Department, the Mobile Crisis Response Team, and/or the Neighborhood Policing Division as appropriate. Get-It-Done is for non-emergency reports only. For emergencies, dial 9-1-1. For other Police-related non-emergency issues, call 619.531.2000.

If you or someone you know are experiencing homelessness or in need of assistance, dial 2-1-1 to be connected with an Outreach Specialist. For more information about the reporting and service request features of Get it Done, visit sandiego.gov/get-it-done

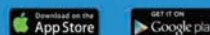

City of San Diego Bicycle Master Plan Update (BMPU)

The City of San Diego is in the process of refreshing its Bicycle Master Plan, which was last updated in 2013. This citywide effort will result in new bicycle facility recommendations and prioritization of active transportation projects to meet the City's Strategic Plan, General Plan, and Climate Action Plan goals. The Bicycle Master Plan Update (BMPU) will also include an increased emphasis on equity and serving areas with the greatest needs. The City is seeking to understand current bicycling patterns and priorities by asking residents to fill out a community survey. Miramar Air Show Returns

The Blue Angels return to the MCAS Miramar Air Show in late September. This year's event will include ground displays and flight simulators; an innovation and tech expo; and military air/ground demonstration teams. The daytime air shows will also feature civilian aerobatic teams, aerial solo acts, vintage aircraft and warbirds.

Aircraft, performers, and exhibitors are expected to arrive at MCAS Miramar beginning Wednesday, September 25; practice day is expected to be Thursday, September 26. The Air Show is open to the public on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, September 27-29. The Marine Air-Ground Task Force (MAGTF) is scheduled at 12:30pm; the US Navy Blue Angels and Fat Albert are scheduled to perform at 3:00pm. All performances and schedules are subject to change. District 6 Councilmember Kent Lee

As we head into the fall season, I'm reflecting on the wonderful memories my family made at summer events here in District 6, especially in University City — from Summer Movies in the Park to the Annual University City 4th of July Celebration. Thank you to all the fantastic volunteers who made the annual UC Celebration possible and to all the community groups who participated!



The City Council is gearing up for a busy fall, with many public hearings and plenty of legislation on the calendar. We also have so much to celebrate in the district, from community celebrations to new and long-awaited infrastructure upgrades and much more. In the meantime, our entire office and dedicated community team remain at your service. Please don't hesitate to reach out with any questions or concerns.

At the end of July, the City Council unanimously approved a long-awaited update to the University Community Plan, concluding a six-year public process that resulted in a new blueprint to create more capacity for homes, jobs, and public amenities in the area — with a particular focus on growth opportunities in the North UC/UTC/Torrey Pines corridors. The community is one of the region's most critical hubs for innovation, transportation, and our regional economy — serving as home to UCSD, many life science institutions, and several stops on the recent \$2 billion Blue Line trolley expansion. Ahead of the final vote, I also secured a requirement for an updated and more thorough traffic analysis prior to the implementation of any traffic calming measures on Governor Dr. This future analysis would specifically keep school impacts during peak-period traffic patterns in mind and would help the City use the latest data when evaluating much-needed improvements to promote safer streets. As we now work to implement the plan, I am committed to working with you to ensure the City delivers on necessary community infrastructure, improved parks and open space, and additional affordable housing as part of our long-term vision for the University Community.

Finally, the City of San Diego's Arts, Culture, and Community Festivals (ACCF) City Council funding program has been renewed for Fiscal Year 2025 and we invite eligible UC-serving organizations to apply! City Council Offices award funding to nonprofit organizations and public agencies for community, social, environmental, cultural, and recreational needs for lawful public purposes. The ACCF applications are now open (to September 13, 2024). For more information about the programs and application processes, visit sandiego.gov/citycouncil/accf.

Many parents, like me, have started another school year. Alyssa and Oliver had a great first few weeks of school, and I'm wishing all our students, teachers, staff, and parents a fantastic year ahead. We look forward to seeing UC residents in the community soon!

City looks for public feedback on waste collection fee proposal

In 2022, San Diego voters approved an amendment to the “People’s Ordinance” to allow the City to charge a cost-recovery fee for trash and recycling collection services the City provides to residential properties. Now the City wants to hear from San Diegans who receive trash and recycling collection services from the Environmental Services Department (ESD).

The City will host an Online Questionnaire and a series of open house meetings to evaluate the level and types of service provided by ESD and how that would impact the cost of waste collection for residential properties. Developing a fee structure would allow the City to provide enhanced and more tailored services, such as increased recycling collection frequency and replacement bins at no additional charge.

University City's Newest Olympian

UC resident Sarah Levy recently made her mark on the global stage by winning a Bronze medal with the U.S. Olympic Women's Rugby Team at the Paris 2024 Games. Her achievement reflects the dedication and hard work that have propelled her to the elite level in her sport.

Born in Cape Town, South Africa, Sarah moved with her family to San Diego at the age of three. Rugby was already in her DNA, as a close family member had played on South Africa's national team. During her time at University City High School, Sarah showcased her athletic talent across various sports, including soccer and cross-country track.

But it wasn't until she went to Boston's Northeastern University in 2014 that she discovered her true passion: women's rugby. From the moment she joined the Northeastern Huskies, she was "grabbed by the sport," ultimately becoming team captain.

After graduating in 2018 with a degree in health sciences, she began playing with the New York Rugby Club in the Women's Premier League. "A couple of years later I joined USA Rugby, competing in the more traditional 15-player version of the sport," Sarah, 28, said.

"Eventually, USA Rugby invited me to be one of 23 women to train for the seven's team [a 7-player squad] at the Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista for the next Olympics cycle." Based on performance, Sarah was chosen for the 2024 women's rugby team.

Sarah did not wait to shine. In her Olympic debut in Paris on July 28, she marked the occasion by scoring the first try (a touchdown in American football) for the U.S. team as they triumphed over Japan in their opening match, 36-7. Despite this personal best, Sarah said, "My biggest moment came when we beat Australia in the final seconds of the game to win the Bronze Medal."

Today, Sarah is finishing up a doctorate degree in physical therapy and planning to train for the next Olympics in Los Angeles in 2028. "I do want to play again," she said. And so does all of UC, Sarah!

UC Planning Group Meeting Update

The University Community Plan was passed by the City Council on July 30. This action by the Council was preceded by passage of Blueprint SD, the amendment to the City's General Plan, and the adoption of the associated Environmental Impact Reports for Blueprint, the Hillcrest Focused Plan Amendment, and the University Community Plan Update. The Mayor signed the ordinance adopting the UC Plan on August 7.

I am immensely proud of the record of service by the University Community Plan Update Committee, chaired by Andy Wiese, whose members served the entire six years, devoting thousands of volunteer hours analyzing, debating, and ultimately improving the resulting community plan. The Subcommittee held over forty public meetings, and together with City Planning, we took thousands of comments from members of the community on the plan. Many community concerns were addressed, at least in part, including affordable housing, improved mobility options, inclusion of a traffic study for Governor Drive prior to any changes under Complete Streets, and additional policy language regarding retention of grocery stores in our retail plazas.

I want to publicly thank each member of the Plan Update Subcommittee and the University Community Planning group for their tireless work on the plan update.

This community is the most biodiverse in North America and we are pleased that as part of the plan update, an additional 166 acres of open space will be dedicated as parks and transferred to the management of Parks & Rec. We are also hopeful that the three proposed linear parks included in the plan can become a reality soon. We thank City Planning for strengthening the language in the plan for the MHPA.

Thanks to City Planning for countless hours of agenda planning and review meetings with Andy Wiese and myself, and to our Planner, Suchi Lukes, for her calm, professional demeanor, and clear answers to community questions.

Thanks to Michaela Valk, the Mayor's community representative, for attending just about every UCPG and Plan Update meeting and helping to keep the process on track. Thanks to community representative Zach Burton from Councilmember Lee's office, and to Councilmembers Lee and LaCava for guidance on the plan update.

Andy Wiese, Plan Update Subcommittee Chair and Professor of History specializing in Urban Planning at SDSU, together with his profound knowledge of our community, provided the update process with unique perspectives and insights and the ability to conduct the plan update meetings. There is no way the plan update in its present form would have been possible without Andy's leadership and careful attention to detail. Our entire community recognizes his consummate skill and holds him in their highest regard. I'll thank him one more time.

Finally, I would like to thank the UCCA and specifically Diane Ahern for being our invaluable partner, providing a consistent information forum for the plan update and the UCPG and making the process work.

The UCPG will meet in a different location on September 10 only: the La Jolla Institute for Immunology, located at 9420 Athena Circle (just west of Regents Road on the east UC San Diego campus) in their first-floor conference room. This meeting will be hybrid. Everyone, including UCPG board members, may attend either in-person or via zoom. We will return to our regular meeting room at Alexandria's Grad Labs in October.



Pure Water San Diego Update

The Pure Water construction crews made notable progress on pipeline installation and tunnel construction in the University City area. Work will continue through the end of the year as part of the Morena Northern Pipelines & Tunnels project. Construction activities include tunneling in three locations and pipeline installation along Nobel Drive and Genesee Avenue.

Approximately 14,568 linear feet of pipeline and 1,188 linear feet of tunnel have been installed to date. Construction notices are shared online at UTC.PureWaterSD.org. For questions, email PureWaterSD@sandiego.gov or call 833.882.7973.

In August, Pure Water construction crews began a new construction phase on Nobel Drive between Lombard Place and Genesee Avenue. Crews will continue installing one 48-inch wastewater pipeline and one 30-inch brine pipeline for the Morena Northern Pipelines and Tunnels project in University City.

The southbound lanes of Lombard Place will close, and one lane in each direction will be open in the northbound lanes of Lombard Place. After each shift, steel plates will be placed to allow cars to drive over the pipeline trench, and all lanes of Lombard Place will be open.

Working hours will be from Monday through Friday from 7:00am to 5:30pm and occasionally on Saturday from 9:00am to 5:00pm. This work continues through Fall 2024. San Diego City Council Adopts the University Community Plan Update

On July 30, the San Diego City Council unanimously adopted the University Community Plan Update. This plan, along with the Citywide General Plan, provides a long-range vision and serves as the framework to guide neighborhood growth and development over the next 20 to 30 years.

The University Community Plan Update replaces the 1987 plan. It guides how land is used for future homes and jobs while addressing the need to preserve and celebrate natural, historic and cultural resources. It also identifies improvements to streets for people to walk, bike and take transit, as well as improvements to parks for people to play and socialize.

The University Community Plan Update provides opportunities for up to nearly 29,000 new homes. It focuses on providing opportunities for a variety of new homes for people of all incomes over the next 30 years and beyond, which is especially important in areas that have a higher level of resources and access to high-paying jobs and transit.

While actual home and job growth will occur based on demand and property owners' future actions, the plan provides a strategic framework to ensure that the growth meets the City's needs to best improve the lives of people living in the surrounding communities.

The updated plan reinforces the community's role as a major employment center and adds up to 72,000 additional jobs across various sectors, including office, retail, scientific research, technology institutions and health care.

The updated plan also further protects the community's canyons and hillsides by dedicating 166 acres to open space and recreation.

The plan is consistent with the Blueprint SD initiative which was unanimously adopted by the City Council on July 23. Blueprint SD is an amendment to the General Plan that will align these plans and future community plan updates with Climate Action Plan goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by placing new homes and jobs near existing and planned public transit, parks and other daily needs.

The City Planning Department thanks community members, business owners, organizations and other stakeholders for their years-long involvement in updating the Community Plan. During the nearly six-year process, the Plan Update Subcommittee, as well as the Community Planning Group, held more than 40 meetings combined. Multiple workshops, surveys and documents were also made available for the Department to receive feedback, which helped shape the overall vision for the community plan.

It's National Preparedness Month: Make a Readiness Plan Today

The City of San Diego Office of Emergency Services asks residents to think about what you and your family would do in an emergency. You may not be together when disaster strikes. It's important to create both a communication and an evacuation plan. Take a look at the list below; it contains steps to help get you started. For more info, visit the Office of Emergency Services at: sandiego.gov/oes

Develop a Communications Plan

- How will you contact one another?
- How will you let family know that you're somewhere safe?
- Identify someone to alert in the event that a pet is at home alone while your away
- Understand that certain communication networks may not be available during a disaster (IE: electrical lines may be down; cellphones and computers may not be fully charged)

Document Contact Information

- Collect phone numbers and emails for out-of-town relatives, doctors, vets, schools and employers
- Make sure all family members have copies of contact information

Plan an Evacuation Route and Meeting Area

- Identify two ways out of your home
- Chose an area right outside of your home, in case of a sudden emergency, such as a fire
- Chose a common meeting place outside of your neighborhood, such as a library or community center
- Identify the routes to leave your area in the event of an evacuation
- Consider those with disabilities and make sure meeting places are accessible for all

Fire Safe Council Presents

Learn about risks associated with living in an area surrounded by canyons, how vegetation around the home affects fire risk, and how to maintain access for first responders and their vehicles. At the end of the presentation, the Fire Safe Council will have 10-year smoke detectors available for those who wish to get a new smoke detector. First come first serve on the smoke detectors. People must sign in for a smoke detector beginning at 3:15 and stay for the presentation.

Decorating your Yard with Monarch Butterflies

Donna Dinan's backyard was the joyous setting of the latest University City Garden Club meetup featuring the topic of "Decorating your yard with Monarch Butterflies." And the La Jolla Colony neighborhoods must really attract butterfly lovers as the speakers also live in the same North University City area, Heidi Boose across the street in the La Valencia neighborhood, and Mark Hughes from the Madrid complex – showing that you don't need a yard to raise Monarch butterflies.

Heidi and Mark provided a very informational presentation about how to attract, raise and rear Monarch butterflies. They also gave a historical perspective about the dwindling numbers of the butterfly, with the western population plummeting 99.9% in recent decades (approximately 10 million in the 1980s to 1,914 in 2021). But there is hope as insects reproduce quickly, and since they are backyard insects that migrate in North America, everyone can help out. The key...grow milkweed!

Two types of milkweed can be found, narrow leaf (which dies out on its own during winter), and tropical (which will need to be cut back). Milkweed can be grown in ground or in pots, as shown below.
