# SUMMARY OF UCCA GENERAL MEETING November 19, 2024 at University Community Library Excepts of Minutes taken by

Motions were made and passed to approve the October Board Meeting minutes and Financial Report.

#### **Public Safety Reports**

SDPD Officer Anderson Brown (AB): Resource officer. The transition to the new chief is going well. Stats: top calls in UC: medical emergency, civil, property, nonviolent. Top time spent on calls by type: medical emergency, domestic violence, property, non-violent, civil. Top number of reports written: larceny, theft from motor vehicle, vandalism, burglary, breaking/entering. 18 accidents, 4 hit runs, no DUIs, no fatalities. Talked about what pedestrians and bikes should do when sirens are heard - they should clear the intersection if in the street. 222 "get it done" reports submitted for northern division. Average of 1.46 days to clear. Homeless outreach team - did just under 100 interviews. 20 citations given. Just under 10 arrests. Around 75 interviewees declined services. The Cop Team: Community Oriented Policing Team. Heading by Jessica Thrift and four other officers. They are focused on Get it Done submissions, violation of signs, etc.

There is one trolley officer assigned during mall hours. Plus mall security. For trespassing after mall hours, police are called by mall security.

Police have insisted on fencing and private security at the Cosa Verde property.

There is a 20-day grace period to educate the community on the new city daylighting parking restrictions.

#### **Public Projects Reports**

Pure Water Project Update - Matt Parks & Clem Wassenberg: Clem is retiring. Carlos Molina (CM) is taking over. There has been 3 tunnels, 1671 linear feet of tunnel installed. Carrier pipe at rose canyon is completed. Just completed the 2nd tunnel today. Continuing tunneling at 1805. The newer contractor is making good progress. Continuing work at 52 tunnels. Tunnels are complete but need vertical pipes installed and hooked in. When complete will move back to under 52. Construction around UCHS should be complete by end of December 2024 Flaggers onsite at Decoro to help pedestrians and bikes cross Genesee. Light is on flash. Crane at UCHS demobilized by the end of 2024. Final connection of 40 linear feet being installed at crane at 52. Focusing on getting out of Genesee at 52 south of 52. Should be done by the end of Q1 2025. Includes temp paving and curb stuff. Moratorium on work near the UTC mall from Thanksgiving to New Years. Pipe completed under Genesee between North Rose canyon and Genesee. The project is expected to be done by the end of March 2025. Median reconstruction was also discussed by Colleen Block.

#### **Elected Official Reports:**

Zach Burton (ZB) from Kent Lee's office: Thanks for coming to Marcy Park Dedication. Trees for troops program, which provides Christmas trees for active service members. Please get the word out to active duty families. There is a link on Kent Lee's website. Kent Lee and ZB will be at Holiday party.

UCPG: Chris Nielsen. (See page 12 for UCPG meeting recap.)

#### Open Discussion:

Library report Jackie: Friends of the Library book sale was very successful. Friends of the library purchased books for library programs. There is currently a veterans program at the central library to help with job search, housing search and other resources. The library has received significant feedback from the community with regards to the \$1.9M improvements. Please make your suggestions to Melissa Martin.

Helen Liebowitz - FOL is doing a membership drive. Forms are on the counter of the library.

Fee & Trash Recycling - Paula Roberts, Aqua Community Relations Grouppresented information outside the meeting but did not do a presentation. Fire Safe Council: Several members of the UC Fire Safe Council attended the county meeting presentation. The focus of the meeting was on the Montezuma fire. This fire showed that urban fires in canyons happen and have big impacts. Six homes suffered significant damage in the Montezuma fire. None were totally destroyed.

## Package Theft Prevention Tips

Millions of packages are delivered every day in the U.S. and thieves know they are delivered straight to your front door step where they may sit for hours until you come home.

Here are some tips to ensure your packages are delivered safely!

- Tracking numbers let you see when your package is supposed to arrive. This gives you the ability to pick up the package immediately upon delivery or to set up an alternate method of pick up.
- Ask your neighbor to please pick the package up for you or Leave a note on your door instructing the carrier, where to leave the package or request the delivery to be at a location where somebody will be home.
- Request a "Signature Delivery Option." This ensures the package will not be left on your doorstep. If you are unable to sign, the package will be taken to the post/carrier office.
- 4. Request a specific drop off time when you will be home.
- 5. Use a post office box and pick up all your packages there.
- 6. Have packages delivered to your workplace if possible.
- If purchasing something online from a large retailer, have the item delivered to a local branch of the store so you can pick it up in person.
- Request that the shipper holds the package at their facility for pick up.
- Use Nextdoor.com to communicate any suspicious vehicles seen roaming the neighborhood after delivery times, take pictures if possible.
- Call 911 if you see a theft occur and report all package thefts to San Diego Police 619.531.2000 or online www.sandiego.gov/police/crimereports/startaccess.
- 11. Set up a surveillance camera system aimed at you porch like Ring, Nest or Samsung's SmartCam. Let it monitor your entire front porch area. Some of these can record 24/7 video footage and send instant motion alerts to your smart phone. If you have any suspicion that a package might have gone missing, simply check the delivery time (as confirmed by your shipping service) against the stored recordings from your camera and see what happened. If indeed a theft has occurred, you can download the video and use it as evidence when you file your police report.

## SDPD Inland Community Relations Officer Reminders to Public

If you are driving a car, cycling, or walking and you hear a siren from a first responder, such as police, fire, or paramedic, it is imperative that you move out of the way to prevent further injuries.

- · Cars are expected to move to the right,
- Cyclists and pedestrians must move out of the street and intersections expeditiously.
- Emergency lighting is non-directional.
  - Non-emergency vehicles cannot predict the path or maneuvers needed to expedite first responder travel to the location of an emergency.

## Northern Division - Captain Aguilar's Advisory Board Recap

(Coastal and Inland Communities)

C.O.P team - Explanation of new team, Community Oriented Policing: In short, the community-oriented policing team is a proactive group of 4 Officers and a Sergeant. We will be in the field to address community concerns specific to Northern Division both inland and our Coastal Communities. Our proactive team will include meeting with retailers, community members, and other stakeholders to address the day-to-day concerns that are happening in our communities. The concerns can range from an oversized vehicle parked in your neighborhood, illegal vendors, illegal beach fires, violations on the beach and boardwalks, parking concerns, quality of life concerns, Letter of Agency concerns/trespassing, parking violations, traffic concerns, request for additional patrols, and so much more. The team is designed to be the initial responders to concerns that the patrol officers do not always have the ability to handle due to higher priorities.

#### **Community Updates:**

- E-bike education/enforcement Northern has been conducting e-bike enforcement in La Jolla and on the boardwalk. (There is no e-bike registration program.) Record your serial number for bikes.
- Vendor enforcement Northern has been enforcing the Street Vending Ordinance throughout the division. Our Officers cannot enforce on private property without an LOA on file. Call the Non-emergency line to report Vendors.
- VHO/OVO enforcement (Stats) as of September 1, 2024;
   3,180 parking cites (2,250 violation of signs, 551 OVO, 379 other) and 171 Vehicle impounds.
- Safe lot update new dashboard is up and coming for receiving live updates on vacancies in the City.
- · Quality of Life concerns please use Get-it-done.
- New Intervention Team at neighborhood policing- Chronic community issues, in-between outreach, and enforcement, undiagnosed mental health, the team works towards conservatorships and additional resources. For example: A subject had 163 arrests, since 2018 - worked with City Attorney, arraigned, and put into a residential program. (All programs are through courts, PD does not manage caseload).

#### Community Questions Submitted to CRO's:

- ABC licensing- SDPD crime statistics are considered when businesses seek an alcohol license.
- Graffiti Reporting Get-It-Done at SDPDGraffitistriketeam@pd.sandiego.gov (There is no pay program for graffiti).
- PERT- requests can be sent to CRO or called in to nonemergency.
- · A community flyer is being created for E-bike awareness.
- Parking lot gates are closed by a 3<sup>rd</sup> party contractor. Any concerns go to Parks and Rec. (619.525.8213)
- Enforcement at the Jetty by Beach team, COP team, and 3<sup>rd</sup> watch, call non-emergency with concerns.
- Bait Bike Operations Are conducted by the Night Beach Team and COP Team.
- The COP Team has been able to successfully reduce the number of Get-It-Done requests the past three weeks. The requests have gone down from 375 to 55.

## Save Lives This Holiday Season: Don't Drink and Drive

My office has the tough duty of seeing the specifics of every fatal DUI that happens across the county and as you can imagine, the details are heart-wrenching. Case after case documents how lives were cut short and family units left in shambles with the painful knowledge that the catastrophe could have been prevented by a very simple act: not driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Just this month a 25-year-old man in North County was sentenced for driving under the influence of drugs and causing the death of a mother and her 4-year-old daughter. Also this month, a 38-year-old drunken driver was found guilty at trial of running over and killing a man as he walked to work in University Heights last summer.

These defendants, just like any person, could have prevented the tragic outcomes of these cases by simply not driving while under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Instead, here I am telling you about the death and destruction caused by bad decisions.

Unfortunately, the number of young drivers involved in fatal DUI-related crashes has increased this past year. More than half of the individuals charged with DUI homicide offenses in 2024 were between the age of 18 and 26 at the time of the collision.

Our office has a specialized team of prosecutors and investigators who bring justice to DUI offenders who cause death. We just received a nearly \$900,000 grant – our eleventh one in a row – from the California Office of Transportation Safety to prevent and prosecute impaired driving deaths and DUI-drug cases. This grant comes as fatal DUI numbers in San Diego County remain at an all-time high with 25 people already being killed this year.

My message to every driver in San Diego County is clear and I hope every reader will help me spread the word: If you are caught drinking or drugged driving, you will be prosecuted. If you kill someone because of your impaired driving, you can be charged with homicide.

As we enter the holiday season when many people are celebrating with drinks or other substances, please begin your celebration by designating a sober driver or planning for a ride. Do not end the year with a DUI on your record or even worse, by taking someone's life. The combination of alcohol and marijuana have been the cause of death in several DUI cases. Even though either substance may be legal to consume at the appropriate age, it's not legal or safe to drive while under their influence.

At least 30 people die every year in San Diego County due to DUI driving. Here are some of the recent statistics that I hope will assure you to make a sober driving plan if you plan to consume alcohol or take substances that could impair your judgment.

- In 2020, 33 people were killed in 30 DUI-related crashes.
- In 2021, 39 people were killed in 36 DUI-related crashes.
- In 2022, 33 people were killed in 32 DUI-related crashes.
- In 2023, 32 people were killed in 29 DUI-related crashes.
- This year, 25 people have been killed so far in 20 DUI-related crashes.

Since DUI crashes are 100 % preventable, I am calling on all Californians to think twice before getting behind the wheel while under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

When you're invited to that next holiday party or as you celebrate the year coming to an end, don't become a San Diego statistic of someone gone too soon or someone who caused another person's death. Plan on how you will get home safely and don't let anyone drive who you suspect may be impaired.

On behalf of our entire team at the District Attorney's Office, which is dedicated to building safe and healthy communities, we wish you a joyful and safe holiday season.

These celebrations and more are a wonderful reminder of the vibrant spirit and sense of community throughout University City.

As we enter this new year, I am determined to continue building on our community partnerships and shared accomplishments. Together with our dedicated District 6 team, we're ready to tackle the challenges ahead and make meaningful progress for our community.

Thank you for your trust, collaboration, and support. Here's to a 2025 filled with connection, community achievements, and continued growth. Wishing you happy holidays and a prosperous new year!

## **UC School Cluster Construction Updates**

San Diego Unified continues to make progress on improvements across UC Cluster schools, with several ongoing projects throughout the community.

The substantial site modernization at Spreckels Elementary is quickly approaching completion. Designed to enhance campus visibility and safety, the project includes a new parking lot with an on-campus student drop-off and pick-up area that leads to a renovated student services facility serving as a monitored, controlled campus entryway. On campus, improved hardscapes and landscapes guide students and staff to a new two-story classroom building, renovated existing classroom buildings and an upgraded multipurpose building. Soon to open for public use, an expanded joint-use facility will serve as a community park after school hours, featuring a new natural grass field, hardcourts, play equipment, and a parking lot. Project crews are currently finalizing landscaping work, capping off the significant renovation of the Spreckels campus.

The Spreckels modernization followed initial work at Standley Middle School, where the district expanded the joint-use facilities to include a new aquatic center, outdoor pavilion, and extended walking path. A new solar photovoltaic system was also added to campus. With the Standley improvements and Spreckels modernization completed, the district is now preparing to upgrade Standley Middle School with its own site modernization. This upcoming modernization will include upgrades to the existing campus buildings, including classrooms, restrooms, and support spaces. A new secure and accessible entry to the administration building will be added. Campus grounds will also be enhanced with new signage, accessibility improvements, drainage upgrades, and hardscape repairs and replacement. A walking path from the Radcliffe parking lot will be installed, connecting the hard courts and lower joint-use areas. Construction is estimated to start in early 2026. Additional projects throughout the cluster are also underway. The planning and schematic design process has commenced for whole site modernization projects at Curie and Doyle elementary schools. A solar photovoltaic project is under construction at Doyle Elementary, with another solar system planned at Curie Elementary School. Together, these projects greatly improve campus sustainability and bring the district closer to its goal of powering schools with 100% renewable energy by 2035.

Security improvements at both Curie Elementary and University City High School are nearing completion, with modifications to the main office entryways at each school to create secure, monitored campus entry points equipped with remote access technology. A similar project at Standley was recently completed.

That's not all for UCHS. The stadium turf field was recently replaced, and work has started to remove all aging drinking water fixtures and replace them with strategically placed, filtered, hydration stations. For more info: sandiegounified.org

## Let's Walk University City! Walk Audit at Standley Park

Last month, on a cold and blustery Saturday afternoon, UCCA volunteers, accompanied by Standley Recreation Center acting director Anabel Wood, conducted a Walk Audit of the walking path at Standley joint use park on Governor Drive using the AARP Walk Audit Tool Kit, a guide for assessing a community's walkability. Armed with clipboards and worksheets and pens, our group set out from the Rec Center and followed the circular path in a clockwise direction to the east, walking in front of the pools, continuing past the Little League ball field, and turning right to follow the path into the joint use field and in front of the Standley pavilion stage. At the back of the park, we walked parallel to the fence that separates the park from the canyon as we headed back towards the picnic area, the playground, and eventually ended up where we started – at the picnic table in front of the Recreation Center building.

Along the way, we talked with several neighbors who were also enjoying a walk in the park. We noted maps depicting the park and the trail, water fountains and restrooms, benches, and even a nature sign about the Coastal California Gnatcatcher Bird and its habitat. The walking path is flat and level; it is concrete in some areas and decomposed granite others. We observed people of all ages using portions of the walking path including some with walking canes and others strollers.

One item to keep in mind is that some of the path travels through Standley Middle School fields and on school days, that portion of the path is closed to the public. In general, the path is open on weekends and when school is not in session. Those who must drive to the park will find street parking on Governor Drive as well as at the Standley Rec Center and the Swanson Pool lots. In our highly unscientific opinions, the path is appropriate for people of many different physical abilities because it is flat and it offers shorter loops within the longer loop that skirts the edge of the park. One thing we forgot to do is measure the distance of the longer loop. That will have to wait until next time. ## Science on the Edge: Mark Zumberge's Quest to Understand Earth's Challenges

Physics might not seem like an obvious path to exploring San Diego's fascinating yet fragile environment, but for Mark Zumberge, it was the beginning of an extraordinary journey. While studying at the University of Michigan in the 1970s and later earning a Ph.D. at the University of Colorado, Mark never imagined how his expertise would shape a career that would take him to the frontlines of environmental and geophysical research.

In 1981, newlyweds Mark and Cathy moved to University City, where Mark began what would become a lifelong career at Scripps Institution of Oceanography (SIO). Over the next four decades, he tackled some of the world's most pressing marine and environmental challenges, including tsunamis, volcanic activity, plate tectonics, sea level rise, ocean acoustic monitoring, and soil erosion.





One of Mark's current projects involves placing and monitoring sensors along the cliffs of Beacon State Beach and the railroad corridor in Del Mar. These sensors detect minute changes in soil tilt and displacement over time. "The idea is to see if there are signals preceding these sudden, catastrophic cliff failures, so we can develop an early warning system," Mark explained.

Mark has also studied soil erosion caused by rising sea levels in the Mississippi Delta south of New Orleans. "The land there is sinking at several millimeters per year," he said. "They're losing land so gradually that it's hard to notice—about a football field of land disappears every hour."

Another major focus of his research has been measuring seismic activity using fiber optic sensors on the ocean floor off the Pacific Northwest, where a magnitude 9 earthquake is expected within the next 100 years. "The recurrence interval is roughly every 500 years," he said. "We know an earthquake struck off the coast of Oregon in the 1700s because the tsunami it triggered was recorded in Japan."

Throughout his career, Mark has authored or contributed to over 75 scientific papers published in leading geophysical journals. His work has taken him to remote research sites from Greenland to Antarctica, and next spring, he will travel to Costa Rica for seismic research.

Mark and Cathy raised their three children—Andy, Allie, and Marianne—in University City, where all three attended local schools. Cathy, who holds a master's degree in business, spent years managing the business program at UCSD Extension.

#### **UC Planning Group Meeting Update**

The UCPG had a short agenda again for its meeting on November 12. Thanks to Alexandria for the use of the meeting room and the patio for voting. An election was held at our meeting location for the new UCPG District 4 (UC San Diego residents). Three UCPG seats were available. The results were:

- Mike Borisov elected to seat R4-A, term ends March 2026.
- Emma Chavez elected to seat R4-B, term ends March 2027.
- Henry Taylor-Goalby elected to seat R4-C, term ends March 2025.

The new voting members from District 4 will take their seats at the next UCPG meeting. We'll move forward with city-required training for new planning group members.

We had a routine action item to vacate an easement to the city for a water main at 10290 Campus Point previously. The city routinely requests easement vacations of public utilities completely within large developments. We recommended approved unanimously.

Georgia Kayser developed a survey for the UCPG board to use to rank our CIP projects that were submitted to the city in July. This list will be approved by the UCPG at our next meeting and then submitted to our council office. The next UCPG meeting will be either December 10 or January 14, depending on the availability of agenda items.

Upcoming we do have an information item from Alexandria on their proposed 10210 Campus Point project, which will be implemented under the new community plan and includes mobility and housing elements. Since this project is of interest to the community, I have summarized what we know. We have limited information on the project, just a description from Development Services. The elements of this project are to be coupled with the Alexandria "Genesee Avenue / Campus Point Mobility Initiatives" proposed and described in an Information Item given at the UCPG on May 9, 2023. This mobility initiative involves the installation of Smart Signals on Genesee from Nobel Drive north to Scripps Heath Driveway on Genesee, and creation of a cut-through from Genesee to parking structures on the ARE campus. It also involves some micro-mobility initiatives, such as safer biking and pedestrian routes, and shuttle services to transit.

The project proposes 2,205 Dwelling Units of housing and proposes 5,153 parking stalls. The housing and parking should not be considered as a package. ARE could choose any mix of biotech space, housing, and parking to develop, depending on market conditions. These two numbers should be considered maximums. Keep in mind that ARE is a primarily biotech developer.

At last night's UCPG meeting I read a letter from ARE saying that they, in conjunction with UC San Diego, were going to implement the Smart Signals portion of their project within the next three to four months. ARE will likely go through several revisions of the project in the near term.

#### Development Services Dept. Description of project PRJ-1114473

As a property owner, tenant, or person who has requested notice, you should know that an application has been filed with the City of San Diego for a Tentative Map to subdivide 11 existing lots into 15 lots located at 10210, 10260, 10290, and 10300 Campus Point Drive and 4110, 4161, 4210, 4224, and 4244 Campus Point Court and to vacate a portion of the cul-de-sac at the terminus of Campus Point Drive. This project now proposes construction. The project proposes 2,205 dwelling units within 8 multi-level buildings and proposes 5,153 parking stalls (within four (4) 7- and 8-story parking structures and surface parking). A Planned Development Permit is required for deviations to height (180 feet tall where 120 feet is the maximum) and lot configurations to the base zones (lots without frontage). The project also proposes a Site Development Permit to allow an increase the residential density within the MCAS Airport APZII - Airport Safety Zone from 0.2 dwelling units per acre (du/ac) to 2 du/ac and to increase density in APZ II Transition Zone from 2 du/ac to 60 du/ac. A Neighborhood Development Permit is required for development within the Community Plan Implementation Overlay Zones - A and B. Total gross floor area proposed is 2,248,815 square feet. The 100.7-acre site is in the IP-1-1 and EMX-1 Zones within the University Community Plan Area.

## Pure Water San Diego Update

The Pure Water construction crews made notable progress on pipeline installation and completed both Rose Canyon tunnels boring operations in the University City area in November. Work will continue through the end of the year as part of the Morena Northern Pipelines and Tunnels project.

Construction is currently underway on Genesee Avenue between Centurion Square and Decoro Street and near State Route 52. The current phase of the project involves pipe installation in the completed tunnels, pipe installation north of Rose Canyon towards Decoro Steet and Nobel Drive and completing work at the San Clemente receiving shaft at the SR 52 on ramp.

To facilitate this construction the following traffic control have been implemented:

- Northbound Lanes on Genesee Avenue will be closed between Centrurion Square and Decoro Street, with all traffic directed to southbound lanes.
- Decoro Street, east of Genesee Avenue, will be closed during working hours, 6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m Monday through Friday, and open outside working hours and on non working days.
- "No parking" signs are in place on Decoro Street, parking restrictions will be enforced.
- Detours are in place during working hours.
- Residents to use Avenida La Bahia to avoid Genesee Avenue and Decoro Street intersection.
- Flaggers are onsite as needed to help direct traffic.
- North and Southbound traffic on Genesee Avenue will be maintained in both directions.

As of November 2024, nearly three miles of pipeline and nearly a quarter-mile of tunnel have been installed. Construction notices are shared online at UTC.PureWaterSD.org. For any questions, email PureWaterSD@sandiego.gov or call 833.882.7973.
