

Pure Water Project Sees Light at the End of the Tunnel

The Pure Water construction crews continue to make significant progress on pipeline installation and tunnel construction in the University City area.

In late January, traffic control was put in place at the intersection of Nobel Drive and Genesee Avenue for two weeks of preparation work. Following the preparation work, the contractor will remove traffic control from the intersection to install large-diameter pipelines on Genesee Avenue between Decoro Street and Nobel Drive, before returning to the intersection in early March to install pipelines through the intersection.

- The preparation work in the intersection of Nobel Drive and Genesee Avenue is scheduled Monday through Friday from 6:30 am to 5:00 pm. As with all construction, the schedule is subject to change.
- Two-way traffic on Nobel Drive and Genesee Avenue will be maintained. All right turns will be permitted, and left turns will be detoured via U-turns at Esplanade Court to the north, Lombard Place to the east, Decoro Street to the south and Cargill Avenue to the west.
- Traffic signals around the intersection will be placed on flashing red with flaggers directing traffic during working hours. Traffic signals around the intersection will return to current operations during non-working hours.
- 24/7 access for emergency vehicles, residences and businesses will be maintained.
- If bike lanes are temporarily impacted, cyclist traffic will be maintained by flaggers.

For safety reasons, please follow all posted signage and detours, and anticipate traffic delays and construction noise. If possible, please avoid the intersection and use Interstate 5 or Interstate 805 to La Jolla Village Drive as alternate routes.

SUMMARY OF UCCA GENERAL MEETING January 21, 2025 at University Community Library

Excerpts of Minutes taken by Katie Rodolico, UCCA Secretary

Public Safety Report

SDPD Officer Anderson Brown (AB): Resource officer. The second wave of smart streetlights is being started. In south UC there will be smart streetlights installed along Governor at 805, Genesee, and Regents. The smart streetlights read license plates and can be used to fight crime. Lots of discussion lately about fires. The Community Relations Officer for local fire is Captain Alma Lowry alowry@sandiego.gov

Public Projects Report

Pure Water Project Update - Carlos Molina (CM), Completed the tunnelling in front of UCHS. But they still need to connect the vertical shafts to the trenched horizontals. Completed the pipe connections south of SR52. Curbs and gutters reinstalled will be restoring temporarily. Hope to have the intersection fully open soon since there have been accidents there. Current work is occurring in the following areas: north of Rose Canyon at the tunnel shaft by the railroad tracks; north of Decoro towards Nobel where there are two trenches because of conflict with utilities; Continuing underneath SR 52, and continuing tunnelling at 805 at the Executive Drive shaft. Pure Water will be moving out of the Marion Bear parking lot by next month. Access will be restored to the parking lot with a full restoration later. Work on Genesee, under SR52: The pipe from Marian Bear to center of Genesee almost done. Contractor is making progress on pipe issue under SR52. At the Nobel Drive and Genesee intersection work will occur in 2 stages: The first stage is prep work due to the trenches running 20' deep. Beams will be needed to shore up the trench. Prep work is required because the installation over 20' deep and beams will be needed to shore up trench. That will last between 4 and 9 days. Started staging 1/21. Surveyors will be out this week and then drilling will begin. Flaggers will be onsight during work hours. Left turns are only impacted during work hours. The entire project should be complete sometime in May or June.

Elected Official Reports

Evan Bridgham and Omar Teran-Sosa - representing Supervisor Terry Lawson Remer. Omar will be taking over. The board voted for a special election for that district to occur on April 8. A lot of discussion about fire response. The county has an operational plan. The Office of Emergency Services coordinates fire response between CAL-fire, local fire, etc.

Zach Burton for council president pro-tem Kent Lee: Sandiego.gov/fire - great resource. Another site, alertsandiego.org, is run by the county and gives up to date info on disasters and evacuations.

Liane Barkhordar for Congressman Scott Peters: Rep. Peters and Chair Westerman are working on a bill to restore forest health and improve fire response. Congressional app challenge winner announced in December: 1st place app called Checkpoint allows students to check in to La Jolla Country Day School office.

Special Reports

UCPG - Chris Nielsen: Last meeting UCPG welcomed 3 new district 4 (UCSD) board members. Miramar Base commander Col. Hermann gave a presentation. There were two recent fires on base. Poway fire and SDFD assisted. UCSD presented updates to the 2018 long range plan. They have opened new housing and are working on more. UCSD asked for a UCPG recommendation for a banner district. Alexandria might be presenting Campus Point project that includes housing and a new intersection onto Genesee. They've applied for a development permit for Costa Verde - no details available yet. Costa Verde is not being presented at the Feb meeting but will be presented "soon". There are two library projects in the CIP list. One was approved back in 2005. The other makes use of the state funds from Sen. Atkins office. Nominations for 4 UCPG residential seats. Notice needs to be made to CN by Feb 11 if you wish to run for a seat. Election at March meeting.

Friends of the Library - Helen Lebowitz: Library budget cuts are hanging over our heads. City is suggesting 20% cuts across the board. As fundraisers and advocates for the library we all should contact all city council members and the mayor to reduce the proposed 20% cuts. Please join Friends of the Library. You can also donate books and puzzles for the 2 sales a year. Books that aren't popular at the book sales (text books for example) they try to sell through "operation book support". If the book is accepted and sold Friends gets 40% of the sales price. Friends donated \$6k to this branch - which is matched by city's matching fund. Friends funds various programs at the library. Under budget cuts city matching will be reduced from \$1.2M to \$800K.

Committee Reports

Phil Fowler, Treasurer - presented Financial Report FYE 12/31/24.

Diane Ahern – WIll submit a new grant application for street medians, and outreach. Completed a walk audit of Standley fields for AARP. Audience member Sally and her neighbor did a walk audit for AARP near the senior housing at Gullstrand and Kantor and are featured in an AARP video.

Barbara Gellman - Neighborhood Watch: Dispatch: Capt. Hara working on another phone tree. All dispatcher can answer reports of noise or burglary - The All bot gathers the information and texts it to dispatch. The '*' feature on the non-emergency line used to take you to the front of the queue, now goes to the All bot - you have to ask for "dispatch dispatch" (twice) and you'll be routed to dispatch. Attended "Inside SDPD" program (next one in June). You rotate through different sections. It's a 2.5 hour project at the Kearny Mesa center. Run by San Diego Police Foundation. Very informative. Suggested donation of \$20 to the SD Police Foundation to attend.

Volunteer for UCSD's Brain Health VR Study

The UC San Diego Brain Health Virtual Reality (VR) Study is currently seeking participants 50-85 years of age to participate in a brain and body training program at UCSD's off-campus health science facility (east University City). Participants will be randomly assigned to one of three groups: virtual reality only, physical activity only, or a combination of both to find out if and how physical activity and virtual reality impact brain health in older adults. The study spans 8-9 months in total with four scheduled assessment visits and 16-week period of active involvement.

Study procedures include:

- MRI brain imaging
- Bone density scan (involves radiation)
- Cognitive tests and questionnaires
- Physical function tests
- Blood draw

Who can participate? Participants must be fluent in English and able to safely ride a stationary bike. Participants cannot have pacemakers, claustrophobia, or a fear of needles or blood. Participants will be financially compensated with \$585 in cash for completing all assessments.

Scammers Exploit Victims in Natural Disaster Emergencies

When devastating natural disasters strike, like we are seeing in Los Angeles this month with the catastrophic and deadly wildfires and like we've experienced in years past in San Diego, conditions become prime for scams. Simply put, bad actors have a knack for exploiting people in desperate situations.

Inevitably, scammers, looters, gougers and unlicensed contractors come out during states of emergency, ready to prey on people trying to rebuild what they lost. Considering the recent destructive wildfires, this is a good time to remind the public that in these vulnerable times, unlawful activity by greedy businesses, contractors or fraudsters will not be tolerated.

During a declared state of emergency, it is illegal for a business to increase its prices for essential goods or services by more than 10%, unless they can show their own costs have been increased. In addition, looting during a state of emergency carries harsher penalties. Price gouging and unlicensed contracting during a state of emergency is not only a crime, it also can further victimize someone who is already suffering great loss. Here is what the price gouging statute applies to:

- Food (including for animals)
- · Goods or services used for emergency cleanup
- Medical supplies including isopropyl alcohol and antibacterial products
- · Home heating oil
- Building materials
- Housing
- Transportation
- Gasoline

It is also a misdemeanor for a hotel or motel to increase regular rates by more than 10% during a declared emergency and for 30 days following the state of emergency. Consumers should be extremely cautious if approached by aggressive agents, adjusters or contractors after a disaster. Most businesses are honest and have good intentions, but there are always bad actors waiting to take advantage of disaster victims.

Working as an unlicensed contractor during a state of emergency is a felony. Keep these tips in mind when selecting a contractor:

- Ask for proof of licensing such as a pocket license and a second photo ID.
- Always verify that the license number matches the contractor you are dealing with.
- Beware of scare tactics, odd calls or unsolicited contacts.
- Make sure the contractor carries workers' compensation and liability insurance.

In the aftermath of natural disasters, debris-clearing scams often surface. Do not provide payment upfront and be sure to ask where the debris is being taken. Scammers often ask for money up front and then disappear. Sometimes they dump debris on a neighbor's property or park, which may cause you to be responsible for the costs and penalties.

The public is also warned to be cautious when dealing with persons soliciting for purported "victim relief" charities. Many legitimate organizations seek contributions during or after an emergency, but scammers often use phony charitable pleas in times like these. Potential contributors should insist on seeing proper credentials before offering to help. Also, make sure you thoroughly vet anyone posing as an insurance agent to verify that the person is a legitimate professional.

Violations of the price gouging statute are subject to criminal prosecution that can result in a year in jail and or a fine of up to \$10,000. Violations are also subject to civil enforcement actions including civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per violation, injunctive relief and victim restitution. We stand with our neighbors to the north, and we want San Diegans to know our Consumer Protection Unit is always busy at work on behalf of the community. As your District Attorney, I'm committed to increasing communication and accessibility between the DA's Office and the public. I hope these consumer and public safety tips have been helpful. Several important California laws will take effect. Here are some highlights of the changes coming in 2025:

- Reforming Conservatorship for those with severe mental illness: This year, San Diego County will begin implementing Senate Bill 43, a law passed in 2023 that modernizes California's mental health conservatorship laws and make it easier to get severely mentally ill and addicted people the help they need. The law significantly modifies the legal definition of "grave disability," which can be used to evaluate the condition of a person with a behavioral health illness and will help us reach a small, but very visible, segment of our homeless population who up until now have been allowed to languish on the streets, often dying alone and forgotten by society. - Increasing Paid Family Leave and Disability Insurance benefits for California Workers: A 2022 law, SB 951, reaches full implementation this year, bringing increases to wage replacement rates for Paid Family Leave and State Disability Insurance. Lower-income workers can receive up to 90% of their wages, while middle-income workers will see their benefits increase to 70%, making it easier for more Californians to take time off to care for family or recover from illness. - Strengthening Tenant Protections: Tenants facing eviction will now have double the time to respond to legal notices and court filings. This new law provides renters with 10 days instead of the previous five to address eviction lawsuits, giving vulnerable residents more opportunity to seek legal assistance and avoid becoming homeless. - Cracking Down on Retail Theft: A suite of new laws will help address rising retail crime. This bipartisan set of laws provides new tools to crack down on retail theft, smash-andgrab robberies, property crime, and auto burglaries while holding criminals accountable. - Improving Intersection Safety: To reduce traffic accidents and save lives, drivers across California will no longer be allowed to park within 20 feet of an intersection. In San Diego, city crews are already working to repaint curbs, remove meters, and educate the public on this change. The new state law, which is currently in effect, prohibits stopping or parking a vehicle within 20 feet of any marked or unmarked crosswalk or 15 feet of any crosswalk where a curb extension is present. This applies to any intersection in the City of San Diego with a marked or unmarked crosswalk. San Diego Police will be handing out warnings to violators of the law for the first 60 days. Beginning March 1, 2025, motorists who park within 20 feet of any crosswalk, marked or unmarked, may be cited. For more info, visit: sandiego.gov/parking/enforcement/daylighting



UCSD's ALERTCalifornia – Developing Technology to Stay Ahead of Natural Disasters

Based at the University of California San Diego, ALERTCalifornia is a public safety program working to understand natural disasters and determine short and long-term impacts on people and the environment to inform management decisions.

ALERTCalifornia has more than 1,144 high-definition, pan-tilt-zoom cameras deployed across California providing a 24-hour backcountry network with near-infrared night vision to monitor disasters such as active wildfires. ALERTCalifornia cameras can perform 360-degree sweeps approximately every two minutes and can view as far as 60 miles on a clear day and 120 miles on a clear night.

Walk a Mile in UC

With the opening of the joint use field at Spreckels Elementary, UC residents can now do a walking/jogging loop around Standley Park for approximately one mile. We have a beautiful public space from Standley Middle to Spreckels Elementary. This is a joint use project between San Diego Unified and the City of San Diego. The joint use areas are available to the community except when school is in session. When Spreckels is not in session the gate is open for walking around the track and for playing on the grass field and the playground structure.

The one mile walk begins at the pathway at the Little League field next to Standley Middle School. Proceed past the stage and behind the other baseball field. Continue towards the Rec Center past the playground. Head to the Governor Drive sidewalk and continue west to Spreckels past the Little League field. Turn at the sidewalk along the parking lot and through the gate to the Spreckels track. Make a lap around the track and then retrace your steps back to the original starting point at the first Little League field. One mile!

Parking during non-school hours is available in the lots at Standley Middle or Spreckels. You can use either end of the route as the starting point for a one-mile walk. For a shorter walk (about 1/3 mile) start at the Standley Little League field, past the stage, behind the baseball field. Instead of continuing on that path, turn right to walk alongside the Standley Pool and back towards the starting point.

Some road trips take you to destinations; others open doors to discoveries you never imagined. Case in point? Patty Smith.

"In junior high school, I took a field trip on a yellow school bus to visit my first museum," recalls Smith, co-founder of the nonprofit ArtBusXpress. "My classmates and I traveled all the way from Riverside to the San Diego Museum of Art." That journey sparked a love of learning that deepened with later trips to the Southwest Museum in Pasadena and Natural History Museum in Los Angeles.

"It was life-changing," she says, reflecting on an experience that would shape her lifelong passion for arts and science education. A University City resident since 1968, Smith has spent the past 23 years working to ensure that other students have similar opportunities.

ArtsBusXpress has helped fund or offset the cost of field trips for an astounding 230,000 TK-12th grade students and their teachers across San Diego County's public and charter schools — ensuring that the transformative power of discovery, creativity, and learning remains accessible to all.

With a dedicated team for two part-time employees, a bookkeeper, and an engaged, hands-on Board of Directors, ArtsBusXpress is forging ahead into a challenging year as it continues serving 42 school districts across San Diego County.

"We anticipate that many school districts will face significant budget cuts impacting programs across the board," she noted. Yet, despite the hurdles, ArtsBusXpress remains steadfast in its mission – ensuring that the journey of discovery and creativity never comes to a halt.

Last year, the organization took children on an unforgettable field trip to The Map, a stunning 2,200-square-foot LithoMosaic at Kellogg Park in La Jolla Shores. Sponsored by the Walter Munk Foundation for the Oceans, the intricate artwork beautifully showcases the underwater topography of the Grand Canyons of La Jolla while celebrating over 100 marine species native to our coastal waters.

"I love U.C.," Smith said. "Its commitment to education is inspiring, and I especially love that we're so close to UCSD – immersed in the energy of a world-class university setting."

Smith and her husband, David—a retired dentist from Scripps Memorial—are proud parents of three grown children, Brandt, Jenna, and Todd, and doting grandparents to six grandchildren, one currently attending University City High School and another at Standley Middle School.

If Smith and ArtsBusXpress had one grand wish for the New Year, it would be to welcome a few more funding partners, particularly from the banking or financial services sector. Ever passionate about expanding horizons, Smith dreams of every child having the chance to step aboard a *yellow school bus*—just as she did in her youth—and embark on a journey of discovery, wonder, and learning.

UC Planning Group Meeting Update

The University City Planning Group (UCPG) welcomed our three new District 4 residential voting members of the UCPG board: Henry Taylor-Goalby, Mike Borisov, and Emma Chavez.

We began with an Information item from MCAS Miramar base commander Col. Eric Herrmann. Col. Herrmann described how the base fire department dealt with two fires on the base, one 2-acre fire near the East Gate, and one 12-acre fire south of the south runway. Poway and San Diego Fire Departments assisted with the fires, demonstrating cooperation between Miramar, Poway, and San Diego fire.

UC San Diego presented their strategy moving forward as an information item, including the updating of the 2018 Long Range Development Plan, and the addition of further housing to the campus. The opening of Ridgewalk North this fall will add 2,400 beds to the existing 22,100 beds. UC San Diego is planning a 6,000 bed Pepper Canyon East living and learning facility. UC San Diego expects to house 30,500 students out of a total of 56,000, or 55%, by 2040.

Upcoming in February, we may have a recommendation on a banner district by UC San Diego that would ring the campus. We will very likely have an information item by Alexandria on proposed changes to their Campus Point development, including the addition of housing, together with the mobility proposal for Campus Point and Genesee that they have presented multiple times to the UCPG.

Alexandria is not prepared to answer questions about Costa Verde, for which they have submitted a Notice of Application to DSD. This will be coming to the UCPG as an info item soon.

The UCPG held a discussion about ranking its Capital Improvement Projects list, and during this discussion we were informed by Michaela Valk, our rep from the Mayor's office, that there were in fact two CIP projects for the UC Community Library, one, the original renovation, with cost around \$6M in 2005, and a second CIP project that takes a \$1.9M grant funded by the state, adds some city money, and creates a smaller renovation project that could be funded near-term. The UCPG will add this smaller CIP to on our list and ranked it along with our other CIP projects. We were told it did not matter what position this project was ranked, only that it be on our list.

Nominations will be open for four residential seats on the UCPG board, one for each UCPG district, due no later than February 11. Three business seats, one for each of UCPG District 1, 2, and 3, are also open. UCPG District 4 does not have business members. Elections will be held in March.

Colonel Herrmann, CO MCAS Miramar

At UCPG, CO Herrmann spoke about fires, drones, FAA Air Traffic Control (ATC) and a discussion of aviation course rules that involved North Island, Camp Pendleton, and MCAS Miramar.



Fires 1: There was a fire at MCAS Miramar on Monday, January 13, that sparked south of the main runway. The cause is still under investigation, but it appears that there were workers in the area and in the course of their work, a spark touched off a fire. There was no aviation mishap. The Miramar aviation rescue (ARFF) and Miramar fire-rescue departments responded immediately and were assisted by San Diego FD crews and a SDFD helicopter which did water drops. The fire burned 12 acres, all of which were on MCAS Miramar federal property.

Fires 2: Also related to fires, CO Herrmann mentioned that the Miramar area east of the I-15 is a concern because there is lots of dry brush in that area and there are not a lot of structures that would stop a fire. They are continuing regularly scheduled brush management; and they are also considering the use of goats to help with brush management in the Federal property that is east of the 15.

Drones: There are drone detection systems in place at the MCAS. The base is concerned about unauthorized drones because flying drones in the area and over the installation is both a safety and security issue; and it would impact training and air operations.

FAA Air Traffic Control: CO Herrmann did not discuss changes in flight patterns due to Santa Ana winds but he did mention that the FAA Air Traffic Control occasionally re-routes Miramar air traffic. This re-routing could result in aircraft flying routes other than the usual and customary. Aviation course rules: The commanding officers at Marine Corps Camp Pendleton and Marine Corps Miramar have met with the commanding officer of Navy North Island/Coronado to review flight course rules. This came about because of community concerns about Navy and Marine Corps helicopters and rotary wing aircraft traveling to and from all three bases. For us locally, the big news about course rules is that the Marine Corps and Navy North Island flight operations are involved in the discussion and now everybody is aware of everybody else's course rules. Nothing has changed that we would notice in our University City community. The Miramar aviation course rules are the same as they have been; and they are being enforced by the Miramar Operations Dept and CO Herrmann.

What University City Can Do to Survive a Firestorm

One of the largest fires in San Diego history was the 1970 Laguna Fire which burned 175,000 acres. The biggest was the 2003 Cedar fire which threatened University City, burned 280,278 acres, destroyed 2,232 homes and claimed 15 lives. If the winds had continued from the northeast for a few more hours the 2003 Cedar fire would have burned University, similar to what we are currently seeing in Los Angeles, but we got lucky in 2003.

As of today, if an intense firestorm approaches the University City area, the firestorm will be greeted with fuel, in the form of combustible building surfaces and foliage. University City, with its building stock built before the building codes changed in 2007, would look like the recent LA fire. Very few buildings would survive.

The best thing we can do as property owners is to remove as much fuel as possible before the next firestorm arrives. Having all non-combustible building surfaces is just the start. We need to keep plants away from our houses so they do not burn near the houses. The current recommendation is to have only non-combustible paving/groundcover within 5 feet of our houses. As for larger bushes or trees, the further away from the house the better. Trees should be no closer than 20 feet.

All existing soffits, garage floor vents, roof and wall vents need to have 1/16th inch stainless steel screening to keep small embers out. Before you leave in an evacuation, bring trash cans and any combustible furniture inside the garage. Turn off your above ground irrigation controllers, it was plastic irrigation controllers that melted during the 2023 Maui fire, greatly reducing the water pressure for first responders. Consider turning off utilities before you leave.

The more fuel we give the fire the greater the risk to all structures. If all of us work to reduce combustible items, then we will have starved the firestorm of its fuel. The firestorm could pass through the community and possibly be contained by our non-combustible community.

Will You Do Something Now?

Firefighters dedicate their careers to protecting homes and property from devastating fires. However, when the recent Los Angeles wildfire erupted, even their decades of experience and specialized equipment were no match for its fury. With Santa Ana winds reaching up to 100 miles per hour, no fire department could withstand the unstoppable force of destruction the fire brought. Tragically, some have attempted to place blame on the fire department for the immense losses so many endured.

Yes, this was a true disaster, but responsibility must be shared among many, including Mother Nature. How many homeowners had implemented the fire prevention measures recommended by fire officials? How many eaves were enclosed? How many homeowners had cleared vegetation to create a defensible space around their homes?


Disasters like the one in Los Angeles can happen anywhere. Recently, La Jolla experienced a small brush fire on Gillman that proved difficult to contain. Thankfully, after several hours it was extinguished with no homes being damaged.

Will these fires serve as a wake-up call, or will they soon be forgotten, leaving us vulnerable once again? Both homeowners and the City must take responsibility and work together to mitigate the risks. The cost of prevention may be high, but the alternative—losing lives and property—is far greater.

Ready, Set, Go

Ready -- Take personal responsibility and prepare long before the threat of a wildland fire, so your home is ready in case of a fire. Create defensible space by clearing brush away from your home. Use fire-resistant landscaping and harden your home with fire-safe construction measures. Assemble emergency supplies and belongings in a safe place. Plan escape routes and make sure all those residing within the home know the plan of action.

Set -- Pack your emergency items. Stay aware of the latest news and information on the fire from local re-




Go -- Follow your personal wildland fire action plan. Doing so will not only support your safety, but will allow firefighters to best maneuver resources to combat the fire.




