Back in April 2020, three long time professional San Diego musicians found themselves without any gigs or opportunities to play with other musicians because of the new Covid 19 Pandemic. Having gigged together in various bands for many years, on April 30, 2020 (UNESCO International Jazz Day), Greg Pardue (saxophones), Jack Hoffman (piano) and Roy Jenkins (bass) decided to try jamming outdoors on Greg's front porch where there was plenty of fresh air, a light breeze and room to observe the new concept of "social distancing". They had so much fun that they decided to make it a weekly jam and invited a few friends to check it out because, being outside with mild weather, it was relatively safe for an audience and the musicians even in the throes of the pandemic.

Word got out about great live jazz every Thursday afternoon when public live music performances were almost non-existent. Several local TV stations checked them out and the event garnered local and even a little international media coverage. During the first couple of years the band grew from 3 to 6 musicians in any given week and the audience grew to 30-50 people from all corners of San Diego County. They have also had audience members and other musicians from all around the US and Europe stop by to check it out. Word has really gotten out and this proves Jazz is truly an international

Because the musicians are having so much fun, it has become a rotating collective of around 20 musicians from all over San Diego County and southern California. As the world has started to get a handle on Covid, the audience has also been having more and more fun. They now regularly bring picnics, have wine tastings and bring their kids, dogs and bicycles. Another nice surprise has been USD Music professor, Dr. Angela Yeung. Dr. Yeung has made the Front Porch Pandemic Jazz Jam a class field trip every year since 2022.

Thankfully our neighbors and the University City community have enthusiastically supported the weekly event since the beginning. April 30, 2025 marks the 5th Anniversary of the Front Porch Pandemic Jazz Jam and the musicians and audience are still having so much fun each week it shows no signs of stopping any time soon.

The Front Porch Pandemic Jazz Jam performs Live Jazz every Thursday starting around 4:00pm for 2 hours or so (subject to weather) outside at 5626 Bloch Street in San Diego's University City neighborhood.

# SUMMARY OF UCCA GENERAL MEETING March 18, 2025 at University Community Library

Excerpts of Minutes taken by Katie Rodolico, UCCA Secretary

UCCA February Board Meeting Actions Confirmed the board approval of the January minutes; approved \$1,500 grant to EdUCate!; and approved \$500 grant to UC Fire Safe Council.

**Public Projects Reports** 

Pure Water Project Update: Carlos Molina and Yvette Gonzales - Work continues on the three tunnels: Rose canyon tunnel is complete but still needs to be connected into the shafts at Centurion and just north of the train tracks. Tunnelling continues under I-805 at Executive. Working hours: 6:30am – 5:00pm with occasional Saturday work as necessary. Current work sites: Centurion to Nobel - traffic restriction in place at Decoro, north bound Genesee to west bound Decoro requires a U-turn at Nobel. Flaggers working the intersection of Decoro during work hours. The site near the train tracks will be used to pressure test the system so the grading and retaining walls at that site will be maintained. The three shafts for Rose Canyon: South (Centurian), middle (east of Genesee near railroad tracks), and the North shaft (in center of Genesee, north of Centurion and train tracks) need to be connected to the tunneled pipes. The contractor is currently working on the south shaft connection to the tunneled pipe.

Upcoming work: Genesee at Marian Bear - The contractor will have to shut down Genesee, in both directions, to trench from the Marian Bear parking lot to the trench under 52. This is expected to be a 72-hour closure in April. Plates will be in place so that pedestrians and bicycles can cross, during this work.

Pure Water is working with the contractor to get potholes filled after recent rains. Pressure testing at Rose Canyon will happen sometime this summer. For the north city pipeline \$113M was budgeted; to date they have spent \$86M. This is only for the pipeline from Appleton to the Pure Water processing station at Eastgate Mall. Contractor discovered that the water line valves were inoperable at Nobel and Genesee - so they need to be replaced. Completion expected summer 2025.

**Elected Official Reports:** 

Marc Schaeffer & Juliette Castner for State Senator Jones office:

The following are bills that Sen. Jones worked on or sponsored.

SB2 - Changes the greenhouse gas emissions requirements; save 65-85cents/gallon SB286 - Elderly and youth treated the same; restricts parole for violent offenders SB379: Requires considering of public safety when placing violent predators in post-prison housing

SB356: Allows parole board to see all evidence of crimes by parole applicants SB554: Maintains SB54, prohibits local governments from imposing restrictions greater than the state restrictions, when working with ICE

greater than the state restrictions, when working with ICE SB581- Seasonal Cal Fire employees can be reclassified as permanent employees SB1: - Excludes military retirement and survivor income from state income tax

Drive Smart program will likely be offered again in the summer or fall. Governor Newsom's proposed budget is \$322B claiming a small surplus. The Independent budget office says there will be a shortfall. Real numbers will be released in May. Zach Burton for Councilmember Kent Lee:

Councilmember Lee's office will be having a townhall about the budget. Measure B open houses. Another round of meetings: North UC library April 8, 5:30-8:00pm.

Omar Telon-Sosa (OTS): For County Supervisor Terra Lawson Remer:
Over 500 people assisted in exiting homelessness. Expanded the program to include more providers. Cost is about \$1,600 per person, or \$3,100 per household.
Special Reports:

**UCPG:** Chris Nielsen: Alexandria presented for over 2 hours on the 10210 Campus Point project. The project includes a mobility initiative as well as up to 2200 possible housing units on site. The proposal calls for two new road cuts from Campus Point to Genesee - one way in, one way out. This will allow for better fire access. Adaptive smart signals are part of this project. Alexandria needs 3 discretionary permits for the project. Parcels might be remapped since current parcel lines cut some buildings in half. They are requesting a height variance to allow 180' height vs 130' allowed. UCPG recommended the new parcel map. They approved the 60 du/acre. The project is in the Miramar transition zone. UCPG recommended that the lots facing Roselle Canyon and Sorrento bluffs be limited to 140' to lessen impact of light and risk of bird strikes next to sensitive lands. The rest of the project could be a 180' height limit.' No timeline given - 5 or 6 of the buildings exist and have tenants. They will probably develop 600 housing units to start.

Library Branch Update: Melissa Martin

No budget info yet. \$1.9M grant - at estimating stage. Basics first - flooring, walls, ceilings. Three concerts planned for live music.

**UCCA Committee Reports** 

Financial Report: lower membership dues, lower ad revenue.

**Neighborhood Watch:** Please keep a lookout for damaged looking neighborhood watch signs. Still looking for more neighborhood watch captains.

Senior Watch: Introduction of Valerie Upham - Jemma contacted her about being lead for a program for connecting seniors in our community. The idea is community members and neighbors help their older neighbors pack up and get out in case of fire or emergency evacuation. They are also looking at ways the community can provide respite care for caregivers. (volunteers). The idea is to be a resource for this community's seniors. There was a suggestion to look into You are Not Alone through

the SDPD. Program that uses RSVP officers for wellness checks etc. Reminder that April 22, 6:00pm is a One-on-One with Fire Chief Logan.

# Crimes of Opportunity A Reminder

According to Wikipedia," a crime of opportunity " is a crime committed without planning when the perpetrator sees that he/she has the chance to commit the act at that moment and seizes it. In other words, given the opportunity, a crime can be

committed with little or no premeditation. The following is a partial list of crimes and how to prevent them.

#### Auto break in/thefts

- 1. Lock car in driveway or street if not in garage.
- Leave nothing of value visible in the car including backpacks, hanging wires, laptop cases, gym bags, clothes, packages or mail with personal information.
- 3. Lock car even if leaving the area for a short time.
- 4. Be observant when placing items such as valuables in your trunk; it's best to go home and unload them instead of driving around with them.

#### Home break ins

- 1. Keep all doors and windows locked, if you have an alarm system, use it.
- Lock all side gates. Consider posting a "Beware of Dog" sign even if you don't have one.
- 3. Keep spare keys out of reach from doors and windows
- 4. Install dusk to dawn or motion detector outside lighting and timers inside.
- 5. Do not open doors to strangers, talk through the door, install a peep-hole if necessary. Add dead-bolt locks to doors.
- 6. Lock door from house to garage
- 7.Remove garage door opener from car to prevent possible entry into house.
- 8. Change home address in GPS to a commercial location close to home. In case car is stolen, they won't know where you live.
- 9. Never leave bikes, strollers, lawn mowers, tools, sporting equipment unattended around your home.
- 10. Keep garage door closed unless working in or around area.
- 11. Ask neighbor to take in fliers/papers/packages if not going to be home.
- 12. Don't post "back at 2:00" on front door
- 13. Avoid personal information on internet sites including Facebook. Don't post when you will be on vacation.

#### Miscellaneous

- Never leave your purse in the shopping cart or hanging on the chair or on an unattended desk at work.
- Use an ATM inside. Block screen when putting in pin number
- Don't count money in public
- Meet your neighbors so you know who is a stranger.

If you witness a **crime in progress** such as a burglary, **call 911** and report. **Non-emergencies call 619.531.2000**, when you hear "Mathew" speaking you can ask for "dispatch" 2 times and he will send you to the queue.

## Senior Citizen Scam Alert: Don't Give Money to 'Couriers'

Every year in San Diego County, senior citizens are scammed out of \$100 million by bad actors who trick the elderly into believing any number of scenarios. It's an astonishing figure, but the sad fact is that it's probably even higher. Many people who lose their life savings to a scam are so ashamed that they never report it. With this in mind, our office works day and night to protect vulnerable citizens from falling prey to liars trying to steal their money. Through our Elder Justice Task Force, public education and through prosecution, the District Attorney's Office is leading the way in the effort to halt scams before they wipe out bank accounts. The San Diego Elder Justice Task Force is made up of local and federal law enforcement partners, who work collaboratively to hold perpetrators accountable in state and federal prosecutions. Creating this task force has allowed our prosecutors and investigators to connect dots among statewide and federal criminal rings that target senior citizens.

A popular scam to which many San Diego County seniors have fallen prey involves bad actors tricking victims into thinking their computer has a virus or has been hacked and that the victim needs to allow "Microsoft" or some other company remote access the victim's computer to protect them. Once the bad actor has access to the victim's computer and financial information, they devise ways for the senior citizen to part ways with their cash or victims are instructed to purchase gold, under the guise that the bad actor is safeguarding the money. The most common method for thieves to obtain the victim's cash is by sending a courier to their front door to pick it up. Our office has prosecuted many of these couriers working on behalf of criminal organizations.


Banking institutions are mandated to report this type of suspicious activity to police. For example, if a bank or financial institution employee is aware of a senior citizen removing large sums of money and the employee suspects the senior could be getting scammed, by law the employee must alert police. Keep these tips in mind and discuss them with the people you care about:

- Never allow anyone to install remote access software on your computer or to download apps on your phone.
- Never disclose your home address or agree to meet with unknown individuals to deliver cash or precious metals.
- Do not click on unsolicited pop-ups on your computer, links sent via text messages, or email links and attachments.
- Do not contact unknown telephone numbers provided in popups, texts, or emails.
- Do not allow unknown individuals access to your computer.
- If anyone asks you to pay for something or to secure your money by wiring money, using crypto currency, Bitcoin, gift cards or to pay large sums of cash or buy gold, end contact with that person immediately. You are being scammed.
- · Immediately talk to someone you trust.
- Never believe anyone who tells you that you will get into trouble if you tell someone else about a situation that involves your money or financial accounts.
- Government officials and legitimate businesses will never request you purchase gold or other precious metals.

If you suspect that you have been the victim of fraud, report it or any suspicious activities to the FBI IC3 at www.ic3.gov and also report this to your local police agency; include as much transaction info including:

- The name of the person or company that contacted you.
- Methods of communication used, including websites, emails, and telephone numbers.
- Any bank account number to which you wired funds and the recipient's name.
- The name and location of the metal dealer company and the account to which you wired funds, if you were instructed to buy precious metals.

If you have been the victim of elder abuse, report it to Adult Protective Services: 800.339.4661.



#### Gloria Administration Proposes Reforms to ADU Density Bonus Program, Invites Public Feedback

Mayor Todd Gloria is bringing forward reforms to the City of San Diego's Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) Density Bonus Program that will continue its success in expanding affordable home options while ensuring projects are consistent with the scale and character of San Diego's neighborhoods.

The City Planning Department is preparing amendments to the City's ADU regulations that implement state legislation, include clarifications and corrections, and reform the City's ADU Home Density Bonus Program (ADU Density Program). The proposed reforms to the ADU Density Program include the following:

- Address Infrastructure Needs: Propose options to collect opt-in fees from ADU Density Bonus home builders to fund needed infrastructure, such as parks and libraries.
- Development Scale: Amend the applicability of the ADU Density Bonus Program by applying base zone height and overall allowable building area of a property in a manner that ensures ADU Density Bonus homes are similar in scale to the surrounding neighborhood.
- Parking: Apply parking requirements to ADU Density Bonus Program development outside of the Transit Priority Area. State law prevents the City from requiring parking inside the Transit Priority Area.
- Compliance: Increase fines for violations of the deed restriction for affordable rents on homes created through the ADU Density Bonus Program.
- Adequate Evacuation Routes: Eliminate the ADU Density Bonus Program's applicability in High and Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones unless adequate emergency and evacuation routes exist.
- Fire Code: Apply fire code requirements for multifamily buildings to ADU Density Bonus Program developments, including fire sprinkler requirements.
- Setbacks: Align all ADU home setbacks to be consistent with fire code regulations related to brush management.

Other ADU amendments are also anticipated to be included as necessary to comply with state law and to implement AB 1033, allowing for ADU homes to be available for homeownership.

The tentative public schedule includes the Planning Commission on May 1, 2025; the Land Use & Housing Committee in May; and the City Council in June 2025.

#### Councilmember Kent Lee

I want to start by recognizing an incredible moment in San Diego sports history—four teams made it to an NCAA Tournament for the first time! Congratulations to the SDSU Aztecs and my alma mater, the UCSD Tritons, as both their men's and women's basketball teams achieved this historic milestone. While the results may not have been in our favor this year, it was a huge moment for these student-athletes and for San Diego.

At City Hall, spring marks the beginning of the annual budget process. Due to declining tax revenues and increases in expenses based primarily on weak economic conditions and inflation, the City is facing a \$258 million deficit in the upcoming fiscal year. The Mayor is expected to release a draft of the budget on April 15 and will present the Fiscal Year 2026 Proposed Budget to the City Council on Monday, April 21st. The City Council and Independent Budget Analyst will then comprehensively review the Mayor's Proposed Budget. There will be a series of Budget Review Committee hearings that will give the public opportunities to provide critical input on the budget's development prior to the City Council considering its final adoption in early June. It is likely that deep operational cuts will be proposed to close the financial deficit. This is why community input will be so important throughout the Budget Review process. There are evening Budget Review Committee hearings specifically focused on giving the public an opportunity to participate on Monday, May 5th, and Monday, May 19th. Separately, I will be hosting a budget town hall in District 6 so that I can hear directly from District 6 residents. Stay tuned for details, and as always, you can find the complete budget timeline at www.sandiego.gov/citycouncil/cd6/budget. As we approach this year's fiscal challenges, I remain especially committed to protecting the core services that matter most to District 6 families and our communities.

Recently, I was honored to be named one of Biocom California's 'Legislators of the Year" alongside Senator Akilah Weber, MD! San Diego is a global leader in life sciences, with many of our most innovative life science companies and the families they support clustered throughout District 6. I look forward to working alongside Biocom California and my colleagues to keep San Diego a hub for innovation and opportunity – especially as San Diego seeks to retain its best and brightest while attracting talent from across the country.



Next, my team and I look forward to upcoming community events in University City! Be sure to visit our tent at the Spring Egg Hunt at Nobel Athletic Field and Recreation Center on April 5—stop by to say hello and pick up a fun prize for the kids. And on April 12, we'll celebrate with CalCoast Credit Union as they mark their fifth anniversary in the UC community with a public event. We hope to see you there!

Finally, a quick reminder that the City of San Diego is holding a third round of community open houses to give you the opportunity to learn more about proposed waste collection costs and service options. 


# Day of (No) Silence 2025

Inspired by the colorful painted pillars in Barrio Logan's Chicano Park, the mural features a large tree with winding branches and leaves made up of hundreds of individual paw prints stamped by individual Spreckels students.

Earlier in the year, Spreckels students participated in the KPBS One Book, One San Diego program in which students read *Barrio Rising: The Protest that Built Chicano Park* by Maria Dolores Aguila. The murals in Chicano Park were painted to tell the stories of the local Mexican American communities residing there; they are the largest collection of outdoor murals in the U.S. The park was designated as a National Historical Landmark in 2016.

Fourth-grade Spreckels teacher Lori Huntsman, an ambassador for Students Rebuild, an initiative to encourage young people to use creative expression for the greater good, wanted to extend her students' learnings from the One Book reading to this larger school-wide effort.

For every creative work submitted or youth engaged in creating it, Creative Visions—the foundation that manages the Students Rebuild program—donates \$5 to nine international peacebuilding organizations, up to \$1 million.

#### Swanson to Offer Water Competency Classes for Children

Designed for children ages 6 to 16 years, the Level 1 Water Competency course at Swanson Memorial Pool on Governor Drive is designed to make a safer swimmer. All students who feel confident in their ability to pass the Water Competency Sequence must be assessed by pool staff prior to registering for the course. ### Before the Padres: San Diego's Forgotten Baseball Roots

For many San Diegans, baseball history began in 1969 with the arrival of the Padres in Major League Baseball. But Carlos Bauer knows better. Few understand, as he does, that San Diego's



baseball roots stretch back almost a century before that, a history that includes a young Ted Williams honing his swing, the charismatic Mike Donlin dazzling crowds, and the electrifying barnstorming tours of Satchel Paige.

Bauer's new book, "The Obscure History of Baseball in San Diego: Before the Padres Came to Town, 1870-1936," unearths the city's lost baseball past. With meticulous research, he chronicles forgotten teams, players, and leagues—from dusty sandlots to packed grandstands—revealing how baseball took root in San Diego long before the Padres ever played a game.



"The first reported game in San Diego took place in 1871," Bauer said, citing The San Diego Union's May 4th mention. But San Diego's path to organized baseball was long and arduous, marked by failed attempts before establishing itself as a minor league stronghold and eventually securing a major league franchise.

The biggest challenge? Geography. "We were isolated," Bauer explained. Despite ideal baseball weather, the city was cut off from larger baseball hubs, he said. For much of its history, local city and county leagues dominated, yet San Diego still produced great players and compelling stories. His book, the first to document this history in such detail, includes individual statistics, league standings, and profiles of colorful players and teams. Transportation also hindered San Diego's baseball ambitions. In the late 19th century, travel to Los Angeles required ships or grueling stagecoach rides. "Even after rail service arrived, a promising 1899 Southern California League partnership with L.A. collapsed when the Santa Fe Railroad ended Sunday service," Bauer said.

In 1901, Los Angeles left for the California League, leaving San Diego without a strong regional rival. The city struggled to sustain professional teams, repeatedly forming short-lived leagues with inland towns like Bakersfield, San Bernardino, and Long Beach—efforts that often ended in failure, especially in 1913 and 1929. San Diego's long battle for baseball stability finally ended with the arrival of the Pacific Coast League Padres in 1936, culminating in its major league breakthrough in 1969.

Bauer, who studied history and Spanish at Columbia University and University of Madrid, has an extensive literary background, including translations of Federico García Lorca, Henry Miller and Lawrence Ferlinghetti. He and his wife, Norma, live with their two grandchildren in University City, while he continues work on a five-volume history of baseball in California.

### Summary of University City Planning Group Meeting - March 11, 2025

**UCPG ELECTION** – **RESULTS**: Andy Wiese, Daren Esposito, Neil DeRamos, Josh Kenchel, Sasha Treadup, Jon Arenz, Anna Bryan, and Apolo Madrigal. (All were unopposed, some positions remain vacant.) Thanks to Kerry Santoro for running the UCPG election this year.

#### Agenda

First on the agenda was the monthly Pure Water construction report. The surprise in their report was the projected complete closure of Genesee Ave. in late April from a Friday to a Monday. Southbound lanes will be shut for the initial 12 hours with northbound lanes shut for 72 hours. There will be detours in place while the closures are active.

We were scheduled for the Alexandria Campus Point project action item, followed by an information item presented by a group from SANDAG on the Sorrento to Miramar double tracking project. Due to the length of the Alexandria item, the Sorrento to Miramar project has been postponed until the April UCPG meeting. The UCPG apologizes to SANDAG for the postponement and will reschedule this item as the first, and hopefully only, agenda item in April.

Alexandria presented the 10210 Campus Point project and includes mobility initiatives. The project includes the potential for up to 2200 units of housing on site. The mobility initiative includes two new "road cuts" from Campus Point to Genesee for better access to and from of Genesee, and better fire safety. It also includes adaptive ("smart") signal technology from the I-5 along Genesee to Nobel Drive that will integrate with a UC San Diego adaptive signal project for La Jolla Village Drive, North Torrey Pines Rd., and Regents Road. Implementation of the adaptive signal project for UC San Diego and Alexandria should be a few months.

Alexandria needs three discretionary permits for their project: A new subdivision map changing the number of parcels from 11 to 15 that aligns the parcel boundary lines to correspond to actual and proposed buildings, a Site Development Permit to change the number of allowed dwelling units in the transition zone part of the 100-acre site to 60 dwelling units per acre, and a deviation to raise the height limit from 120' allowed in the EMX-1 zoning to 180'. With these actions by the City Council, Alexandria will be permitted buildout of the site ministerially, e.g., by conforming to the new University Community Plan.

The UCPG recommended approval of the new map and the increase in dwelling units to 60 per acre in the Miramar transition zone but recommended that the lots on the northern side of the site and eastern side facing Campus Point Drive have a height of 140'. We recommended approval of a 180' height limit for the remainder of the site. In support for our recommendation, the UCPG made the following findings.

The UCPG believes that our recommended height deviation balances important goals related to the project site. Lot 1 is on the north side of Campus Point, and 2, 7, 8, 17, and 18 are on the eastern side.

- a. A height deviation to 140' is warranted on lots 1,2,7,8,17, and 18, which adjoin or face Roselle Canyon and Sorrento Valley headlands, to achieve the building design and leasing goals of the applicant, while a 140' limit will minimize impacts to open space recreation, natural resource, the MHPA, including visual impacts to canyon users and light, noise, and physical impacts to wildlife due to night lighting and bird strikes.
- b. The UCPG recommends that a height deviation to 180' is appropriate on the remainder of the site lots which do not face sensitive open space and natural resources to enhance flexibility of site design for the applicant, including maximizing tenant amenities and open space at ground level.

The UCPG will hear the Sorrento to Miramar information item in April. We will also seat new and returning board members. The meeting location is 9880 Campus Point Drive, Alexandria's GradLabs, third floor Terra Nova room, at 6PM. The meeting is hybrid, with full board and public participation allowed via zoom and in person. Zoom details will be in the agenda.

# Safe Parking Proposal for UC San Diego Students

At the March 11 UCPG meeting, Emma Johnson, a community member and recent alumnus of UC San Diego, gave a public comment to introduce a Safe Parking proposal to provide a secure campus location for UC San Diego students to park overnight who are experiencing homelessness and sleeping in their cars in the community. This proposal would provide 16 parking spaces near the UC San Diego police station, providing essential amenities such as restrooms, showers, and wi-fi to support them in their academics while they go through housing insecurity.

UC San Diego currently has 16 beds supporting emergency housing needs, but this is a small number given the roughly 25,000 beds on campus. The safe parking proposal primarily addresses students who live off campus and are subject to the same kinds of housing crises that other community members experience, such as losing a lease, disputes with other housemates, or domestic violence, and who lack financial resources.

Emma Johnson proposed a pilot program, initially small, to begin to address this problem and study the ways and means of implementation. Three members of the UCPG board met with her to make suggestions for obtaining additional data and moving the proposal forward. The UCPG plans a May agenda item to discuss the proposal and write a letter of support for it.

## Water and Sewer Main Work Continues West of Genesee

A City of San Diego Capital Improvements Program (CIP) project is underway to improve the water and sewer infrastructure in the University City area. The University City Improv. 1 project will replace approximately 10,170 linear feet (1.93 miles of existing water mains and install approximately 8,896 linear feet (1.68 miles) of new sewer mains.

Governor Dr. and Stadium St. and adjacent streets: The City of San Diego's University City Improv. 1 project is progressing in its current phase on Stadium Street and Stadium Court. The sewer main work along Stadium Street will extend into Governor Drive during the last week of March/beginning of April. The project will fall back to Eton Ave and Eton Court after sewer main work at Stadium Street and Governor Drive intersection is completed. Sewer pipeline installation along Governor Drive is anticipated to commence late Spring 2025/early Summer 2025. As work progresses through this main thoroughfare, there will be impacts to traffic and noise from construction.

Pennant and Stresemann and adjacent streets: Water pipeline installation is completed on Pennant Way between Stresemann Street and Regents Road. The project is now progressing on Stresemann Street between Pennant Way and Gobat Avenue and will continue on Stresemann Street into Governor Drive in April 2025. Construction work will include installation of new water main and water services, installation of temporary potable water, new fire hydrants, potholing to identify existing utilities, and pavement restoration.

During the time of watermain installation, residences will to be supplied with potable water via temporary water lines also-known-as highlines. For temporary water outages the contractor will distribute outage notices to impacted residences. Residents can also expect traffic delays during working hours and No Parking signs in and around their neighborhood as well as noise generated by construction equipment during working hours. Through traffic will be directed to detour during this time, as construction equipment, excavations, and material will be in the streets. Please note all schedules and construction are subject to change: Residents are encouraged to scrutinize "No Parking" signage once it is installed – they will have specific details of dates and times of work happening on their street(s).


#### Home Hardening and Defensible Space Tips from the Office of the State Fire Marshal

#### Low-Cost Ways to Harden Your Home to Make It More Resistant to Wildfire

- When it is time to replace your roof, replace it with a Class A fire-rated roof.
- Block any spaces between your roof covering and sheathing with noncombustible materials.
- Install a noncombustible gutter cover on gutters to prevent the accumulation of leaves and debris in the gutter.
- Cover your chimney and stovepipe outlets with a noncombustible corrosion-resistant metal mesh screen (spark arrestor), with 3/8-inch to 1/2-inch openings.
- Install ember and flame-resistant vents. Consult your local building official and hire a licensed contractor for this project as these modifications may reduce airflow.
- Caulk and plug gaps greater than 1/8-inch around exposed rafters and blocking to prevent ember intrusion into the attic or other enclosed spaces.
- Inspect exterior siding for dry rot, gaps, cracks, and warping. Caulk or plug gaps greater than 1/8-inch in siding and replace any damaged boards, and those with dry rot.
- Install weather-stripping to gaps greater than 1/8-inch between garage doors and door frames to prevent ember intrusion. The weather-stripping must be compliant with UL Standard 10C.
- When it's time to replace your windows, replace them with multi-paned windows that have at least one pane of tempered glass.
- When it's time to replace your siding or deck, use compliant noncombustible, ignition-resistant, or other OSFM Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) Products.
- Cover openings to operable skylights with a noncombustible metal mesh screen with openings in the screen not to exceed 1/8 inch.
- Install a minimum 6-inch metal flashing, applied vertically on the exterior of the wall at the deck-to-wall intersection to protect the combustible siding material.

#### Low-Cost Ways to Create Defensible Space and Enhance the Effects of a Hardened Home

- Regularly clean your roof, gutters, decks, and the base of walls to avoid the accumulation of fallen leaves, needles, and other flammable materials.
- Ensure that all combustible materials are removed from underneath, on top of, or within five feet of a deck.
- Remove vegetation or other combustible materials that are within five feet of windows and glass doors.
- Replace wood mulch products within 5-feet of all structures with noncombustible products such as dirt, stone, or gravel.
- Remove all dead or dying grass, plants, shrubs, trees, branches, leaves, weeds, and pine needles within 30 feet of all structures or to the property line.
- Ensure exposed firewood is stored at least 30 feet away from structures or completely covered in a fire-resistant material that will not allow embers to penetrate. Additionally, make sure you have 10 feet of clearance around your wood piles.
- Be sure to store combustible outdoor furnishings away from your home when not in use.
- Remember to properly store retractable awnings and umbrellas when not in use so they do not collect leaves and embers.



#### **Vegetation Density Study**

For the third year in a row, the University City Fire Safe Council (UCFSC) has hired a biological consultant, Merkel & Associates, to assess brush density and growth in the University City area, particularly in government-managed areas that abut private property, to assist in meeting the requirements of the City of San Diego Brush Management Requirements.

Each Fire Safe Council takes different strategies to fulfill the mission of making communities more prepared for wildfires. The University City Fire Safe Council (UCFSC) has put a priority on identifying areas of higher risk of brush overgrowth (particularly along Rose Canyon) so that those agencies responsible for brush management in these specific areas can have a starting point for mitigation.

### Defensible Space and the updated Fire Hazard Severity Zones

Updated Fire Hazard Severity Zone maps and recent wildfires have prompted many of us to learn more about how to prevent and prepare for fire at our homes, in our neighborhoods, and in our communities. Please note that in the City of San Diego, owners of properties which are within a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone and subject to local ordinances and regulations, are responsible for creating defensible space up to 100 feet around the home or to the property line, whichever comes first.

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
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
